WORLD RELIGION DAY

Religious Liberty the Basis of World Peace.

What is religious liberty? The idea as popularly defined means the right to worship without interference from the state, and the right to establish religious institutions maintaining public utilities.

This meaning has been adequate in the past, when civilization was struggling to throw off the yoke of state religion and stimulate the operation of individual conscience, but it must be greatly amplified today.

Mankind is now living in a new age. Humanity has been given a true and ultimate goal, the unity of the peoples of the world. World unity lays upon all peoples the stern responsibility to seek out, understand and employ all the resources of truth and of society to bind together in one humanity the fragments we call nations, races, classes and creeds.

This is the real meaning of the public concern for peace, for the alternative to an organic peace is devastation.

Thus the idea of religious liberty has become transformed. The first liberty is freedom from self, when the soul by independent investigation realizes the oneness of God and the universality of His revealed laws and truths. The second liberty is freedom from traditional culture, when the awakened human spirit understands that one cycle has ended and a new cycle begun. The third liberty is freedom from prejudices, when the sublime truth is felt that all human beings were created by the same God.

Baha'is celebrate World Religion Day on January 15th, in order to testify to their conviction that the foundation of all true religion is one; that God from age to age has through prophetic Revelation called the people back to the teachings of His love. The unity of religion becomes apparent when we can perceive that Revelation has been progressive, first the God of one people, then the God of nations and empires and now the God of mankind.

Religious liberty is a condition which calls for maturity of understanding, moral responsibility and concern for the peace of the world.

"The gift of God to this enlightened age," we read in the Baha'i sacred writings, "is the knowledge of the oneness of mankind and of the fundamental oneness of religion." To bring together the people of good will from the ends of the earth in the spirit of cooperation to the highest interests of mankind is the purpose of World Religion Day as observed throughout Canada and in many other countries.

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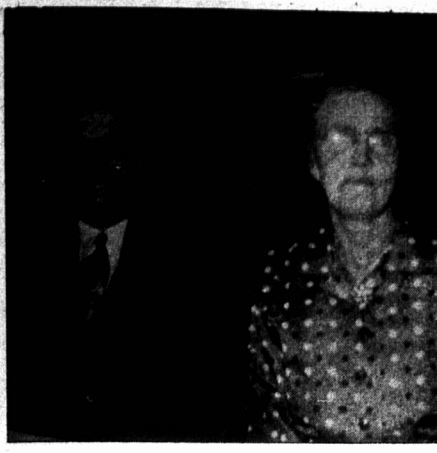

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Mayor Stewart Quoted On Federation Problems

MONTREAL (CP)—The national executive of the Canadian Federation of Mayors and Municipalities met here Wednesday to draw up a policy statement for submission to the federal government Friday.

The federation also discussed a brief now under preparation for submission to the royal commission on Canada's economic prospects. The executive will meet again today.

"We're haunted by the past and threatened by the future," said J. David Stewart, federal secretary and mayor of Charlottetown. He added: "All municipalities are burdened with the debts of the depression years. And during the war years, of course, we had to mark time. Now we're trying to catch up with these lost years and at the same time we must keep an eye on the future. I don't think there is a Canadian municipality that is not growing steadily and with growth are the problems of welfare, education and increased administrative needs."

Mayor Stewart said all municipalities "are hoping for federal and provincial assistance. We are willing to administer welfare, education and slum clearance programs as well as other duties of civic administration, but we feel the financial burden must be shared by the three levels of government."

Pupils Inoculated At Recent Clinics

Charlottetown inoculation and re-vaccination clinics were held in the city schools during the week, under the Department of Health supervision. Six in grades I, received their first protection against whooping cough, diphtheria and tetanus. Four hundred and eighty-nine pupils received a re-inoculating dose and 194 pupils in Grades 8 were re-vaccinated.

It is regrettable that such a large number of children have reached school age without being protected against these dangerous diseases. It is recommended that this protection be given in infancy, with re-inoculating inoculations during pre-school and school years.

Much illness has been prevented and countless lives have been saved by means of injections which are not more painful than a mosquito bite. All parents should see that their children receive this protection from their own doctor, or local health centre.
