NEWS BY TELEGRAPH.

CANADIAN.
QUEBEC, July 17.
 Acting upon the information given to the Local Government, regarding the prevalence of small-pox on the north shore of the St. Lawrence, the Government has given instructions to Dr. Pidgeon, of Perce, to proceed there immediately, and to take the necessary sanitary measures for the prevention and treatment of the disease.
 Mr. Lee, one of the clerks of the Privy Council of Canada, arrived here yesterday morning, and was present on Mr. Langevin being sworn in by the Governor General as Minister of Public Works. Mr. Langevin left for Ottawa in the afternoon by the Montreal boat.

OTTAWA, July 17.
 Last night a woman named Mrs. Frederick, who lives in the vicinity of the deep cut, imbibed too freely and attempted to drown herself in the canal. She deliberately walked down to the bank and jumped into the water, but two young men observed her and lost no time in going to her rescue.

MONTREAL, July 17.
 During a severe thunder storm on Tuesday night, Mrs. Peter Robertson, of Lachute, was killed by lightning, while driving in the neighborhood of her residence. Two persons who were in the carriage with her escaped uninjured, but the horse was killed.

TORONTO, July 17.
 W. B. Hamilton's boot and shoe factory, in this city, was partially destroyed by fire last night. Loss about \$90,000. Stock was insured for \$80,000, machinery for \$10,000, and the building for \$15,000.

UNITED STATES.
NEW YORK, July 17.
 Chastine Cox, the negro who murdered Mrs. Hull, has been convicted of murder in the first degree.

MEMPHIS, July 17.
 Several additional fever cases are reported in this city. There will be another exodus of the populace.

NEW YORK, July 17.
 Anthony Searlaskie, a millieaire of West Chester, was killed this morning by the New Haven Express train.
 The Duke of Argyll sailed for Europe this evening.

BOSTON, July 17.
 During the storm to-day a man was drowned off Fort Independence, his row-boat being swamped. During the storm the city was almost in darkness. At Roxbury the lunatic asylum was struck by lightning; nobody hurt. A man and woman were burned in the wreck of a large hotel at Nantucket beach, and seriously injured. A photographic car was blown to splinters and the artist fatally injured.

A despatch from Augusta, Ga., says:—There has been no rain in this section to benefit the crops for two months; the corn in many places is burned up, and the crops will not average a fourth; cotton is very much behind. This has been the hottest and driest weather since 1839.

NEW YORK, July 17.
 There were twenty-one sunstrokes here yesterday, but only one fatal.

CONSTANTINOPLE, July 17.
 Two officers of the U. S. steamer "Quinnabang," while going on Saturday in a small boat aboard that vessel, were stopped opposite the Palace by Turkish soldiers, and taken before the police authorities and detained two hours.
 On Monday, after an energetic demand by the U. S. Minister, the Turkish Naval Commander, in presence of the crew of the "Quinnabang," made personal excuses, when the minister declared the *amende honorable* complete.

GREAT BRITAIN.
LONDON, July 17.
 Lord Cranbrook, speaking at a great Conservative gathering in the Crystal Palace, took a hopeful view of the future condition of trade, now so depressed. He defended the Afghan war, because it pacified a hitherto disturbed country. He believed Russia would fulfil all engagements by treaty at Berlin, and pleaded for time for the Porte to accomplish reforms in Asiatic Turkey on account of her many difficulties.
 A meeting of Frenchmen in London, to-day, resolved to erect a memorial to the late Prince Imperial on behalf of the French residents here.

THE ZULU WAR.
LONDON, July 17.
 Advice from Cape Town to July 1st announce that an envoy from Cetewayo reached Fort Napoleon June 26th, bearing peace proposals and a line of ivory as a present. He wished to stop the advance of the second division, but was informed that peace proposals must be made to Lord Chelmsford and that the advance would only be postponed on condition that former demands were acceded to.
 General Newdigate is within three days march of Ulundi.

BELGIUM.
BRUSSELS, July 17.
 Another placard threatening the King's life was found posted on the walls of the church.

MISCELLANEOUS DESPATCHES.

PARIS, July 17.
 It is reported that a disturbance has broken out in Bulgaria, in the neighborhood of Rasgood. Bands of insurgents also appeared at Jambali, Eastern Roumelia. Troops have been sent against the insurgents.
 It is reported that several officers who attended the Requiem for the Prince Imperial have been removed and others sent to Algeria.

Garibaldi's Divorce Suit.

According to the Italian papers, and especially to the *Capitale*, which is understood to be fully informed in all that relates to Garibaldi, the General will appear before the Courts in a few days to obtain a declaration of the nullity of his marriage with the Signora Raimondi, celebrated in Rome some fifteen or more years ago. Immediately after the marriage ceremony, and before the bride had changed her dress, Garibaldi received a letter telling him she had deceived him before marrying him. He laid the letter before her. She confessed; they parted there and then, and some months later the lady gave birth to a son. It was stated soon after Garibaldi's arrival in Rome—and this news confirms it—that one of his chief objects was to obtain the settlement of the remainder of his pension on his children. It will be remembered that the Chamber voted him 100,000*l.* per annum, with the remainder of 50,000*l.* per annum to his heirs, but who they were was not specified—an oversight which was somewhat remarkable in the circumstances. Garibaldi has two families of children but neither born in wedlock. The first were by Anita, who died in 1849; the second, Manlio and Clelia, by the Signora Francesca, born since his unfortunate marriage with Signora Raimondi. But, all these being illegitimate, the law cannot take cognizance of their existence, and hence the curious complication has arisen that it can only recognize as his legitimate son a young man who is no child of his, but who, as things are now, is entitled to succeed to the remainder of his pension. Garibaldi, therefore, seeks to obtain a decree of nullity of his marriage with Signora Raimondi, that he may prevent this, and, by marrying their mother, enable Manlio and Clelia to inherit the remainder.

Faith.

The following is an incident on the recent return of some British officers from Afghanistan:—Scene: The wildest part of the Khyber, with barren rocks towering on all sides; an English officer riding along, escorted by a motley company of maliks and tribesmen—men all armed to the teeth; more armed Afreedees in the middle distance; a weary, lonely figure on the dusty road in huge black boots, face burned brick red and fringed by a scanty beard. The figure is clad in a thick wadded garment and has a bundle on its back. "Halt! Who are you?" "A Turkestan." "Where are your comrades?" "I am alone." "Where are you going?" "To Mecca." "How will you get there?" "God will help." "Peace be with you." "And with you." The figure moves off, and the armed circle breaks up. This poor devotee had tramped hundreds of miles through hills and valleys, swarming with cutthroats, secure in his simple faith which had led him to leave distant Turkestan in quest of the still more distant Mecca.

Deliver Those Oats.

Some time ago a farmer residing near St. Johns, P. Q., sold to a merchant in Montreal a lot of oats at 30*¢* per bushel, upon which he obtained an advance of 25*¢*, amounting to \$2,500. Not long afterwards, the market having improved, the farmer sold the same oats to another party at 30*¢*, and on Thursday last gave the refusal of them to a third buyer at 31*¢*, until noon the following day, but immediately sold them to a fourth party at 31*¢*. The last purchaser, however, could not get delivery of the grain, as the first buyer at 30*¢* held the warehouse receipts, upon which he had advanced \$2,500. We understand that this quadruplicated sale of oats is likely to involve the seller in several law suits, and more than one of the parties concerned has demanded the delivery of "those oats."

An Advance in the Price of Sugar.

The Messrs. Redpath have advanced price of granulated sugar 1*¢* per lb., and 1*¢* on low grade yellows. All other kinds of refined sugars are up 1*¢* per lb. This general rise is due to a sharp advance in raw sugar in New York, said to be caused by the reported failure of the beet root crop in Europe. Raw sugar on spot is in few hands, and for small lots a rise 1*¢* is demanded.

A Mrs. Elliott, a laborer's wife on the estate of Sir Victor Brooke, Bart., was lately confined of three living children, two boys and a girl. Being a poor woman, the usual application was made to Her Majesty the Queen, whose welcome bounty has just been received. This is the third time this unusual freak of nature has occurred in the Brooksborough dispensary district within the past three years and three months.

The German Federal Council has under discussion a scheme for triennial budgets and sessions of the Reichstag.
