

New York Allows 2-2 Tie For 2nd. Place With Leafs

NEW YORK (AP) — Bobby Hull's power play goal midway through the second period gave Chicago Black Hawks a 2-2 tie against New York Rangers Wednesday night.

The deadlock stretched New York's unbeaten streak to four games and moved the Rangers into a second-place tie with the Toronto Maple Leafs, three points behind the Black Hawks.

The two teams battled through almost 30 minutes of scoreless hockey after Hull's seventh goal of the season tied the score with New York's Orlando Kurtenbach sitting out a two-minute penalty.

Hull turned Chico Maki's goalmouth pass in for the knotter. Phil Esposito also assisted.

New York's Rod Gilbert opened the scoring with the game barely two minutes old. His eighth goal of the season came on a scramble after Bobby Hull fell across Chicago goaltender Glen Hall's legs.

Hull has been undergoing treatment for hip bursitis, described as not serious by Chicago coach Billy Reay.

Wally Boyer tied it for the Black Hawks midway through the opening period when he lifted a 10-footer past New York goalie Ed Giacomin.

Bob Nevin made it 2-1 New York with 1 1/2 minutes left in the first period, when he beat Hall on a screened shot.

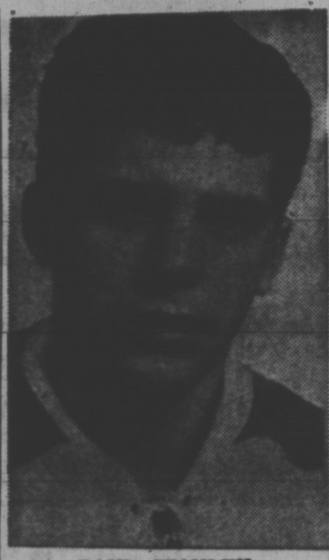

Cats Must Steal Ottawa's Fire To Win Final Game

HAMILTON (CP)—"The best thing we've got going for us," said coach Ralph Szabo of Hamilton Tiger-Cats, "is that we've got another 60 minutes of football to play."

Szabo was commenting Wednesday on his team's chances of making up a 28-point deficit against Ottawa Rough Riders in Saturday's second game of the two-game, total-points series for the Eastern Football Conference championship. Ottawa won the opener 30-1 last Sunday in Hamilton. The series resumes at Montreal's Expo Stadium.

Ottawa won three of four games this year against the Ticats and came from behind in the fourth quarter for two of the victories.

In the only other game between the two clubs this season, Hamilton won 16-12 Sept. 5 at home.

BEST PERFORMER
Szabo isn't deluding himself about the performance of Russ Jackson, Ottawa quarterback who this week was voted the top Canadian and best all-round performer in the Canadian Football League.

"If he has another day like he did last Sunday, I don't give

a damn what we do, there's no way we can stop him."

Jackson called a brilliant game and completed 21 passes in 28 attempts in the opener. Saturday's game starts at 2 p.m. and will be televised nationally by the CBC.

Szabo will start Joe Zuger at quarterback despite a lackluster performance last week. "But I'll use Frank Cosentino if I feel he should go in later on," he said.

Cosentino, backup man to Zuger all season, saw action Sunday and directed the Ticats on the few occasions they showed offensive punch. He completed seven of 14 passes for 99 yards compared with Zuger's one completion in six attempts for nine yards. In addition, two of Zuger's passes were intercepted.

Szabo said defensive halfback Garney Henley is still limping and isn't likely to play. Henley pulled hamstring muscles Sunday.

WINNIPEG (CP) — Saskatchewan Roughriders swept into the Grey Cup final for the first time in 15 years Wednesday night with a 21-19 triumph over Winnipeg Blue Bombers to wrap up the Western Football Conference best-of-three final in consecutive games.

A vicious charge by three Saskatchewan tacklers that sent the ball spinning from the hands of Winnipeg quarterback Kenny Ploen spelled the difference in a drama-filled second half before 18,624 fans.

Ed McQuarters, the big tackle who was a lower of strength in Roughriders' 14-7 first game victory Sunday, scooped up the fourth-quarter fumble and galloped 50 yards for a touchdown.

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Sum-Hi Hockey Tournery On Tap

SUMMERSIDE — Plans are underway for a gigantic kick-off for the Sum-Hi 1966-67 hockey season with an invitation hockey tournament in late December.

Phys-ed instructor at Sum-Hi, Charles Ballem said yesterday that such an endeavor had been held informally in the past, highlighting basketball and volleyball, but this year, the concentration is being placed on hockey.

The tournament has tentatively been scheduled for December 27, and will be a consolation tournery, with each team playing two games. The December 27 winners go to the championship round December 28, while the losers are in the consolation final.

Invitations have gone out to Sussex, N.B. (and if they do not accept, Simmonds, near Saint John, N.B.), and Truro, N.S. high schools. Also invited has been Prince County Vocational High School and Sum-Hi will be the host team, making four teams in all.

Mr. Ballem said yesterday that the Sum-Hi grade day tournament will also feature basketball, bowling, curling and volleyball.
