

Western Strategy Divided On Several Points, Belief

WASHINGTON (AP) — President Eisenhower and Prime Minister Macmillan appeared Wednesday to be at odds on several points of Western strategy in dealing with Russian Premier Khrushchev.

The evidence of differences makes the forthcoming Eisenhower-Macmillan meeting important. The president has invited Macmillan to visit Washington at his convenience. He is expected here about mid-March.

One of his purposes will be to report on his talks with Khrushchev in Moscow and the discussions he also will have held by that time with West German Chancellor Konrad Adenauer and French President Charles de Gaulle.

In the policy rift which exists in the Western camp, Adenauer favors a tough line toward Russia—tougher in some respects than Eisenhower and Secretary of State Dulles have desired. Macmillan, according to available evidence, stands at the other extreme.

Disengagement — Macmillan spoke in Parliament Wednesday about the same time that Eisenhower met with reporters. He said the right thing to do is get negotiations going on such cold war issues as Germany, Berlin, disarmament and suspension of nuclear weapons tests.

Macmillan said he will discuss with German, French and U.S. leaders all major questions, including a study of some form of what has come to be known as disengagement. Macmillan did not use that word, but those who heard him took that to be what he meant.

"Disengagement" is a term which covers a controlled limiting of forces of each side of the Iron Curtain. A reporter at Eisenhower's conference noted that it had been referred to in a communique issued by Macmillan and Khrushchev.

NEED GENERAL PACT
Eisenhower said such things as troop withdrawal or armament controls in central Europe must

come within a general agreement in which we have confidence. . . . You have to have a stronger and better evidence of confidence on both sides."

The president seemed to be saying he considers disengagement a negotiable issue only after substantial progress, for example on the tough problems of Germany.

2. Nuclear tests — Macmillan has some new ideas on how to reach agreement with the Russians to get a suspension of nuclear tests. Talks under way in Geneva since last October are deadlocked. Macmillan discussed his idea with Khrushchev. Eisenhower made clear he did not think much of these ideas, which he declined to spell out.

The United States, he said, had no objection to Macmillan's discussing his thoughts with Khrushchev but what the United States has seen of those thoughts so far "does not reassure us that they are completely practical."

4. Trade — Macmillan and Khrushchev joined in plugging the prospects of increased trade between Britain and Russia. Eisenhower said there are Allied agreements about denying the sale of strategic goods to Russia, and he added:

"I do not believe that at this moment we are ready for any radical change in policy with respect to trade."

In thanking the mover and second of his nomination, Mr. Campbell said he could look back to his first nomination four elections ago when only about forty people were in attendance. Judging by the splendid attendance he considered the outlook for the Conservative Party very bright under the capable leadership of Mr. Shaw.

DR. DEWAR
Following a short address by Hubert Gaudet, Dr. George Dewar delivered a strong condemnation on the Liberal Government for their lack of leadership and their addiction, on the floor of the House, to deal mainly with Federal affairs, apparently in an effort to take attention from Provincial matters. Instead of criticizing the Diefenbaker Government, the doctor said, they should be thankful that Federal funds were made available for the roads to resources program, additional grants to municipalities educational and hospitalization plans. The only time P.E.I. ever received an equal deal with the other provinces was the seven and a half millions for the roads to resources plan, exactly the same as the other provinces.

The centralization in Charlottetown and Summerside of homes for tourist improvement facilities was criticized by the speaker who also stressed the need for a far sighted agricultural policy and increased development of the fishing industry.

The Provincial Conservative leader, W. R. Shaw, congratulated the delegates on their fine choice of candidates and expressed his pleasure in meeting them at the annual convention.

Rudder Repairs On Carferry Will Be Made At Borden Pier

All repairs to the SS Prince Edward Island will be made at Borden and it will not be necessary for the icebreaking carferry to go to drydock, Donald MacPherson, chief engineer of the vessel, made this statement yesterday following completion of an inspection of the ferry at Borden.

The chief engineer said it would take about four weeks to put the ferry back into operation but added that it would not prevent the Abegweit from leaving for her spring overhaul on schedule.

A rudder stock measuring nine feet five inches by eleven inches, will have to be replaced on the Prince Edward Island and will be ordered from Trenton, N. S.

Necessary repairs to the steering engine will be made by engineers of Charlottetown Marine Industries and will begin immediately. Other repairs will be carried out by the ship's crew under the supervision of the Chief Engineer.
