In general the average youngsters of PeeWee age haven't learned much more about the game of hockey than that the object of the contest is to put the puck in the net and they generally haven't yet acquired the slightest idea of the proper methods of positional play at this stage in their development. We were amazed with the way this team broke out of their own zone and the way they would pick up their respective checks when the opposing players had control of the puck.

Brian Lewis is handling the coaching chores for the youthful squad and apparently Brian has spent a lot of hours with these boys in teaching them the finer points in the game of hockey. Lewis also gives the boys a pretty stiff practice session with numerous and varied skating drills and the team has been showing improvement right from the beginning of the season.

We were pleased to see that the youngsters appreciated the way Mr. Lewis has tolled with them. When Brian blows the whistle there is no hesitation from any of the players, they are right there listening attentively for their instructions.

The Lewis coached squad will play the second Peerless team coached by Ivan MacDougall in a final tune-up game, at the Charlottetown Forum tonight at 7:00.

Brian is the referee-in-chief of the Charlottetown Minor Hockey association and in his absence, due to the Quebec trip, Alan Andrews will look after anyone desiring officials for minor inter-scholastic hockey games. Mr. Andrews may be contacted at West Kent or Spring Park schools.

Peerless Pee Wees Start For Quebec City Saturday

Sixteen wide-eyed, but hockey-minded youngsters will climb aboard a CNR train here Saturday morning, enroute to Quebec City and this year's edition of the mammoth International Pee-Wee hockey tournament held in conjunction with the annual Quebec Winter Carnival.

Typical of the young hockey players on this year's Charlottetown entry, the Peerless Pee Wees, is Bobby MacMillan, a grade seven student at Queen Charlotte High School.

A hockey star in his own right at the tender age of 12 years, Bobby has another claim to hockey fame in that he is a brother of Billy MacMillan, star forward with St. Dunstan's University and the leading scorer in the M.I.H.L. and George MacMillan, another valuable member of Jack Kane's SDU club.

This will be Bobby's second jaunt to the Quebec tournament—an event that he rates ahead of the annual visit from Santa Claus—and he readily admits that this year's trip is just as big a thrill as it was a year ago.

The MacMillan household was buzzing with activity today as a final check was made of equipment, sticks, skates, and all the items a boy must have when he sets out for an international tournament of this magnitude. Even the matter of his "Guardian" delivery route has been attended to; this responsibility will fall to younger brother, John, who is playing in the paperweight division.

"Even Mom (Mrs. Stewart MacMillan) has helped out on the route when I had to be at the Forum for 7 a.m. workouts with the team," Bobby said with a grin.

EDUCATION COMES FIRST

Bobby's ambition is to follow in big brother Billy's footsteps and take a crack at professional hockey some day. "But not before I get my education," the youngster hastened to add.

"Our sponsor and coach make sure that our school work is keeping up to par before they allow us to continue with the team," Bobby continued. "Last year my average went up from 82 to 90 per cent when I joined the pee-wees. You see, it makes you work harder so you will be sure of staying with the team."

Quizzed on his team's chances this year in Quebec, Bobby pointed out that last year's team lost by only a 3-0 score to Asbestos, P.Q., and that team went to the final, losing 2-1. "If we can all come up with our best we have a good chance, as we're a lot better this year, and a lot bigger, too," he added.

"It's great to be going again, to get another chance to win for Charlottetown," Bobby said. "Remember last year, when the coach would read all the telegrams from all over the island? It seemed like everyone here was cheering for us, and it made us feel kind of funny inside."

"No, there won't be any homesickness for any of us. I don't think. Our foster parents for the tournament do just about everything—they even cut up our steak for us. And that Mr. Morris is a nice guy—I guess we wouldn't be going if it wasn't for him," Bobby concluded.

Canadiens Blank Detroit; Chicago Nips Rangers 5-4

MONTREAL (CP)—Montreal Canadiens got flawless netminding from Charlie Hodge and a pair of power-play goals Wednesday night to defeat Detroit Red Wings 2-0 and take sole possession of second place in the National Hockey League.

A forum crowd of 13,478 saw Henri Richard and Claude Provost both score goals while Detroit was a man short to provide all the firepower Canadiens needed.

At the other end of the rink, Hodge, an off-and-on performer since he topped the NHL goalies at the half-way mark handed 33 shots to score his third shut-out of the season.

Most of them were less than dangerous, but the pint-sized netminder handled a few hard ones, particularly in the third period when the Wings fired 16 shots at him.

The win lifted Canadiens two points ahead of Toronto Maple Leafs in their battle for second place in the NHL standings.

They still trail league-leading Chicago Black Hawks who met New York Rangers in Wednesday's other League action.

It was New Brunswick's second loss against five wins in the 11-round bonspiel. Stuart Campbell's Nova Scotia rink from Bridgewater, which drew the seventh-round bye, Alberta and Saskatchewan each have 5-1 records.

In other matches in round seven, Fred Durant skipped his Newfoundland quartet from Grand Falls to a convincing first win for the tournament by whipping Manitoba 8-6. Grant Wucker's Winnipeg team rallied for three points in the 10th.

Paul Savage's Ontario rink from Toronto suffered a setback at the hands of British Columbia, 6-5. Ontario now is 4-3 and British Columbia, with skip Denis Perry of Burnaby, is 2-4. Northern Ontario, skipped by Wayne Stecki of North Bay, picked up its fourth win against two losses by edging a Prince Edward Island quartet 10-8. Dave Matheson's Charlottetown rink forced Northern Ontario to go to an extra end before succumbing to its fifth loss against one win.
