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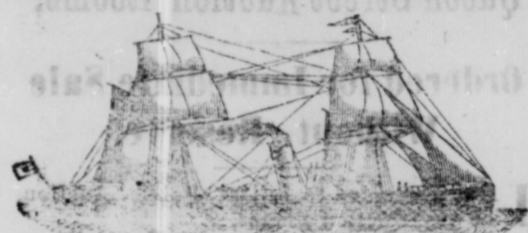

NEWS BY TELEGRAPH.

CANADIAN.

MONTREAL, Oct. 9.

The prosecution of the Consolidated Bank Directors has advanced a stage. One civil suit has been entered against them in the Superior Court at Montreal for the recovery of \$35,000, another against the Bank for a large amount.

OTTAWA, Oct. 9.

The Governor General has refused to commute the sentence of John Boyle, who was sentenced to two years' imprisonment in the penitentiary for uttering counterfeit money.

Mr. Sanford Fleming left for Manitoba last night, where he is to make a personal inspection of the works in that district and of the projected route of the Winnipeg branch of the Canada Pacific Railway. After carrying out this part of the programme, it is said, if time permits, he will make a flying visit to British Columbia.

UNITED STATES.

BOSTON, Oct. 8.

The inventor of the air cushion to prevent elevator accidents tried it at the Parker House yesterday, but the invention failed to work. The newspaper reporters and others in the elevator, which was allowed to drop from the fifth floor, were seriously shaken up and hurt. The damage to property is about \$1,000.

THE INDIAN TROUBLES.

CHICAGO, Oct. 9.

There is nothing new regarding the Indian war. Officers express great satisfaction with the action of Capt. Dodge and his colored troops, who first relieved Payne, although under no orders to do so. He made a march through an infested country with 40 men; and forced his way through the savages into camp, with unequalled valor and pluck. The Indians have a peculiar hatred for colored troops, which they return with interest.

\$15,000 REWARD.

CHICAGO, Oct. 9.

Manager Mullen of the Chicago and Alton Railroad, offers a reward of \$15,000 for the arrest of the robbers who last night stopped a Chicago and Alton train and rifled the Express Company's safe at Glendale, Mo. A proportionate part of the amount will be given for the capture of a part of the robbers.

IRELAND.

LONDON, Oct. 9.

The address and appeal by Parnell and the Home Rulers to the American Irish, says that apart from the effects of the American competition with the products of rentified Ireland, all Irish evils are referable to barbarous land system. Two things are necessary: the 600,000 landless farmers must be welded into an organized body and aid given them. They urge the American-Irish, and all who sympathize with the people of Ireland, to furnish pecuniary aid. The address is signed by Parnell, O'Connor Power, Finnegan, Biggar, and others. It has already won much sympathy. A telegram has been read from New York guaranteeing \$250,000 if any Irish member of the advance party will visit the States. Parnell will probably go.

AFGHANISTAN.

LONDON, Oct. 9.

Specials from Afghanistan report that during the attack of the 6th on the principal heights before Cabul, two companies of Highlanders were opposed to 2000 Afghans. The latter held their ground until the Highlanders were within twenty yards. The Afghan force is said to have been eleven regiments with artillery and an immense number of hillmen. The backbone of resistance is broken, but the people would rise at the slightest reverse to the British. The whole British force was to be within striking distance of Cabul on the 7th.

SOUTH AMERICA.

LONDON, Oct. 9.

A Valparaiso despatch to-day says there was an engagement between the Chilean and Peruvian fleets. The former captured the Peruvian ram "Huascar" off Mejillones.

LATER.

LONDON, Oct. 9.

Private telegrams state that the whole Peruvian fleet has been captured, but these are believed to be exaggerated and based on the first reports concerning the capture of the "Huascar."

NEW ZEALAND.

NEW YORK, Oct. 9.

At the burning of a block of buildings in Dunedin, New Zealand early, in September, seven people were burned to death.

Exhibitions.

To the Editor of the Examiner.

SIR,—Now that the Exhibitions are over, a few comments thereon may be allowed. While admitting that the labor and detail of arranging one is not light, and that the general features were good, one could not help seeing an apparent want of direction in placing exhibits at the Queen's County Fair. "Textile fabrics in wool" were about the only things properly displayed; and one may question the propriety of giving them such a prominent place in an Agricultural Exhibition; and also paintings, photographs and furniture, which ought to come under an art and industrial exhibition.

The poultry, of which there were some good specimens, were placed in an out-of-the-way and small space, and practically unseen. Roots and vegetables were on the ground at a back tiring distance. Flowers were on a flat surface instead of a sloping or pyramidal. Fruit was scattered and name of kind not attached, while the absence of any one capable of giving and information asked for, was striking.

As the judges in the different departments neglected to advise improvement, for the future, in the cases mentioned (and in others that might be, such as the questionable taste and fitness of a hearse being allowed entry), and they must have noticed the want. Perhaps the Commissioners and Secretary may accept it now in the spirit it was offered. Have well-defined sections for each class of entries, and a care-taker who can answer questions. Give the most common and useful articles the most prominent place, such as butter, fruit, vegetables, &c.; and the ornamental will fall into its own place. Require a statement from each exhibitor, of the manner in which his exhibit has been bred, cultivated or made, to be attached to the article, and give prizes for quality, and not so totally for quantity and size. Pay all judges and sell exhibits by auction at the close of the Fair.

The Outfit of a Prince.

The Prince of Wales' two sons, Albert Victor and George, are taking their first long sea voyage. They are going round the world in the ship of war *Bacchante*, which we described some time ago. In their stateroom are two chests, each of which contain the following articles:—

One dress coat, vest and trousers; one superfine uniform round suit; one second cloth do; one double breasted blue waistcoat; six white duck or Marcella ditto; one uniform pilot or Witney frock coat; one pair ditto trousers; one uniform beaver or pilot working suit; one uniform blue flannel suit; one patent waterproof coat, leggings and goshes; one blue Witney or pilot reefing jacket; six pairs Russia drill trousers; eighteen ditto imperial military duck ditto; two pairs white flannel trousers, Dowlais or linen jackets; six cotton or merino drawers; six flannel or merino shirts; twenty-four cotton socks; 6 worsted ditto; 36 shirts with linen fronts, collars and wrists; six Baltic flannel shirts; six Oxford shirts; six night shirts; twenty-four linen collars; twenty-four white cambric pocket handkerchiefs; six silk do; four black silk ties; two ditto Bond street, or Prince Teck scarfs; three scarfs; three pairs sheets; six pillow cases; twenty-four towels; two regulation caps, mohair bands and ornaments; one silk oilskin cover for ditto; white linen cap, gold knot; one leather dirk case; one hair mattress and pillow; three blankets; one feather pillow; three blankets; one counterpane; one set of clues and lines, mounted; two hair brushes; two nail brushes; three tooth brushes; one clothes brush; one set of blacking brushes (what will they do with them?); two combs; four packets of soap; six cases of blacking; one improved quadrant or sextant; one box of mathematical instruments; one telescope and signals; Dr. Inman's Navigation and Tables; one parallel ruler and Gunter's scale, two nautical almanacs; six work books; one log, bound; one journal book; three watch bills; one sight book; books, stationery, &c; two pairs of braces; one portable desk or writing case; one duck clothes bag, with name painted; six pairs white Lisle gloves; two kidd do; two warm do, lined; one black enamelled bag; one set of silver spoons and forks (according to number required by mess); or set of electro-plate (ditto); one looking glass; one leather case, fitted with silk, thread, buttons, etc; one neck shawl, cashmere; two pairs boots; three pairs shoes; spare uniform buttons and rings; one brass plate, name engraved for chest; one woollen rug or boat wrapper; one sponge and bag; small boat compass; box candles; a Bible; and lastly, a Prayer Book.
