Each life is a fairy tale long or short as it may be. For us who are older-grown, we are privileged in our years to read many a one from the opening chapter down to the end of the tale. To be interested always, and many times amazed at the way, never two alike, that Providence has fashioned the story. #### HOUSEHOLD HINT

Even fleec-kind boots can be washed in the tub or washing machine if they are rubber, nylon or plastic.

If you use the machine, put in a few towels to balance the load. A thorough washing now will make them last longer when winter comes again.

Make "butterfly" pork chops. Using inch-thick boneless chops or pork slices, cut almost through the pieces thickness-wise, leaving enough for a hinge. Then spread flat on pan.

For best results when cooking a dish that includes cheese, keep the temperature low. High temperature makes the cheese tough and stringy.

Saffron rice: Add 1 tsp. fine crumbled saffron to 1 tsp. water. Let stand five min. Turn into a saucepan.

Add 4 c. cold water, 1 tsp. salt and stir in 2 c. white long grain rice. Cover tight. Place over a high heat.

When boiling, reduce the heat to simmering; simmer 14 min. Uncover. Let the rice slowcook 5 min. to steam dry.

Stir in 2 tsp. butter with a long-pronged fork. FISH DINNER

TOMORROW'S DINNER Jellied matrilene, baked hadcock fillet, bonne femme, potatoes rissole, garlic bread, whole green beans, vinaigrette on lettuce, half-frozen raspberries on hot or iced coffee or tea, milk.

Half - frozen raspberries on whipped instant dessert; Make up 1 pkg. instant vanilla dessert according to printed directions, but add 1 egg white, whipped stiff, and ½ tsp. lemon juice. Beat until frothy.

Transfer to individual molds and chill. Unmold. Serve topped with half-thawed frozen raspberries.

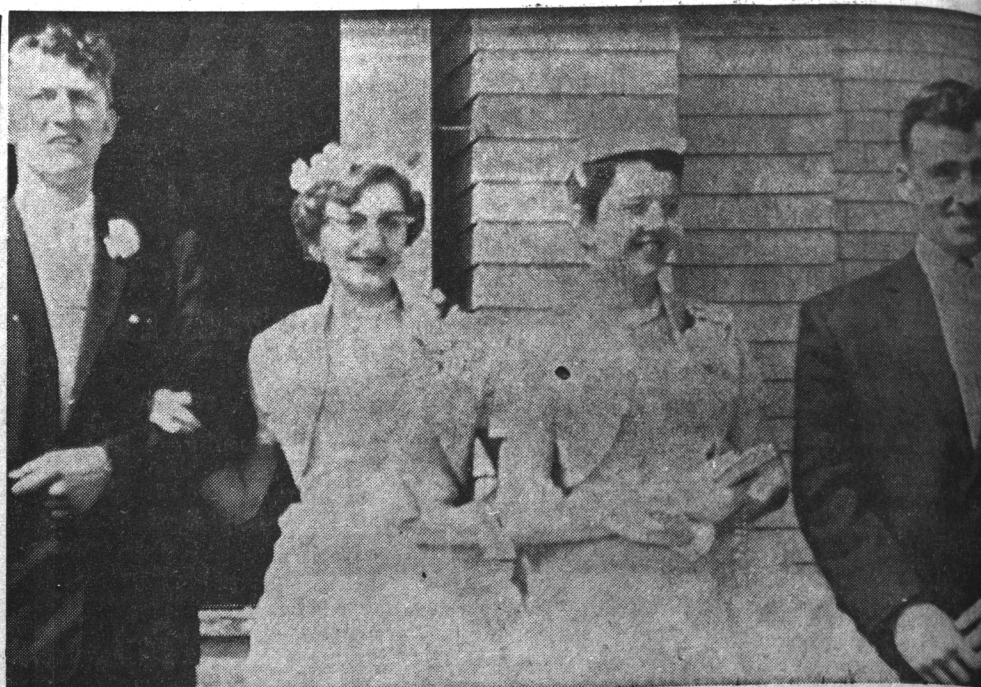
