TICKETS will be issued by the Railway authorities at every station on the P. E. I. Candidates will require to present certificate signed by Superintendent of Education on return trip, otherwise their tickets will not be honored.

THE Scottish Gathering field presents a lively appearance. The grand stand, capable of seating 2,000 people, is completed; from it there is a commanding view of the Hillsborough River and surrounding country. The field has been enclosed all round by a high fence, which will give the officers in charge full control of the grounds. The entrance to the field is by the front gate, on upper St. Peter's Road. A large restaurant, under the supervision of Mr. Alex. McKenzie, confectioner, will supply the requirements of all who will patronize it. Swings, dancing booths, hand stalls, competitors' rings, etc., are all being prepared for the enjoyment of the thousands who assemble to witness the games and athletic sports at this popular gathering.

SAYS the Woodstock, N. B., correspondent of the St. John Star:—"It was announced a few days since that the notorious Father Chiquay would lecture, or preach, in the Presbyterian Church here this (Tuesday) evening, and the announcement made in the Woodstock Press to-day that the Father's visit to this town had been postponed until September next led to some enquiry as to the cause, when the following facts were elicited: The trustees, or a portion of them, had given consent to place the church at the Father's disposal for the purpose of his lecture, but upon reading in the St. John daily papers yesterday a report of the sermons preached by the rev. father in some of the churches of that city, the trustees came to the conclusion that it would be honoring religion to permit such impious allusions and blasphemous discourses to be uttered within the church. They therefore notified their minister that they declined being a party to such a desecration of their church."

Local and Other Items.

THE steamer Clifton left London for Charlottetown on Tuesday evening. The United States railway men admit the success of the Canadian Pacific Railway. THE City Fathers have ordered the electric lamps on Pownal wharf to be lighted to-night. CHIEF ENGINEER ARCHIBALD admits that the P. E. Island Railway is in better order than the Intercolonial. Mr. W. H. STEWART, of the London House, left for Great Britain on Wednesday morning to select fall and winter goods. TICKETS for the Annual Scottish Gathering, on Tuesday next, can be obtained at the Drug Stores of Messrs. W. R. Watson, C. D. Rankin and D. O'M. Reddin. A new switch has been placed in the Electric Light station, by means of which lights can now be turned on or off at pleasure, instead of all at one time as formerly. THE running time of the train which brought Mr. Schrieber and party from Tignish to Charlottetown after the inspection was three hours and a half, or at the rate of over 33 miles an hour. Conductor Kelly was in charge. We understand that efforts are being made to arrange a shooting match between the officers of H. M. S. Bellerophon and some of the crack shots of the Charlottetown Rifle Club. Should the efforts be successful the match will likely come off at Kensington Range on Monday afternoon. THE schooner Azalia, Capt. Walker, arrived at Souris on Thursday with flag flying, and a full trip of large mackerel. Only two weeks since Capt Walker sailed from Souris for the fishing grounds. We must congratulate Capt. Walker on his good luck. The above schooner is fitted out by Messrs. Macdonald, Macdonald & Co.

YESTERDAY afternoon, His Honor Lieutenant-Governor Macdonald paid an official visit to the Right Hon. the Earl of Carleton, on board the flagship Bellerophon. Later in the afternoon, United States Consul H. M. Keim, Esq., accompanied by Vice Consul F. W. Hyndman, Esq., paid their respects to His Excellency. As the Consuls were leaving the Bellerophon the American flag was run up to the fore and a salute of seven guns fired. THE sixth competition of the Charlottetown Rifle Club came off at Kensington Range, yesterday afternoon. The ranges were 200 and 500 yards, seven shots at each. A large number of members attended, some of whom, particularly the new shoots, made very good shooting. Mr. C. R. Smallwood captured the silver spoon, making a score of 60 points out of a possible 70. Mr. A. Peters won the horn spoon.

A BRILLIANT electric light on board H. M. S. Bellerophon illuminated the harbor as well as the southern end of the city last evening. As the "searcher" was revolved from point to point, the reflection in the sky caused many to think that we were having a wonderfully regular aurora borealis in combination with a storm of lightning. The city lights, too, were unusually brilliant, indicating that a little extra "spurt" had been put on, and that after all "opposition is the life of business."

THE Temperance Picnic came off yesterday at Royalty Junction. The usual games and amusements were indulged in. The wind, however, caused a good deal of fun. The balloon ascension was a complete success. The table cloth spread upon the grass was soon covered with a tempting variety, and after singing, "Be Present at our Table, Lord," the company sat down and discussed the good things before them. A short open air meeting was convened and addresses were given by Rev. Mr. McLeod, G. W. P. Cameron, of Boston, G. W. C. T. Watson, of Toronto, and others.
