HALIFAX, Jan. 24 — (CP) — This city will seek assistance from the Nova Scotia government to defray an estimated \$1,328,000 cost for the construction of Junior High School facilities, it was learned today.

The provincial government passed a measure last year providing for such assistance where necessary. Digby, Hanisport, Stewiacke, North Sydney, Dartmouth, Windsor, Dominion and Middleton already have received grants under the plan.

OAKLAND, Calif., Jan. 26 — (AP) — Alameda County A. F. L. barbers last night voted to raise the price of haircuts from \$1.25 to \$1.50 March 1.
