Circulation Contest Winners Are Named

J.T. MacKenna Is President Of 4th Queens Conservatives

J. Thomas MacKenna, Village Green, was elected president of the 4th Queens Progressive Conservative Association at the association's annual meeting held Monday evening at Eldon.

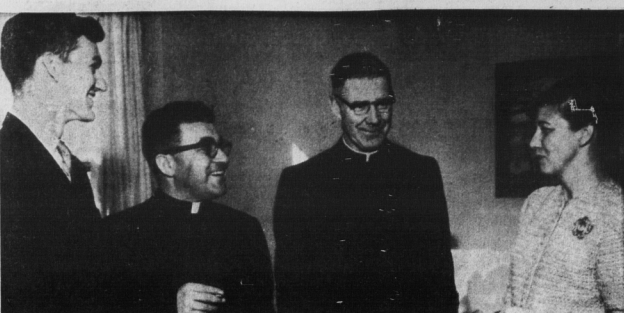
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WUSC OFFICIAL VISITS SDU
