CCF House Leader Wants Clamp On High Interest Rates

OTTAWA (CP) — CCF House Leader Hazen Argue Thursday called on Parliament to shackle the "fabulously high" interest rates charged by some lending firms and retail businesses. He opened Commons debate on his bill, which he has sponsored often in past sessions, to put an interest ceiling of 12 per cent a year on all loans not already controlled by federal law. Reaction of progressive Conservatives who spoke on the bill was comparatively cool. The first Liberal speaker agreed with it in principle but wanted further Commons study of it. Mr. Argue said his measure would not affect bank interest rates, or rates on small loans by finance companies up to \$1,500, which are already controlled. But other loans and instalment credit by stores frequently had "fabulously high" interest charges. An annual rate of 20 per cent was "quite common." Rates by "so-called reputable firms" ran as high as 54 per cent. Simpsons-Sears and Eaton's extended credit through budget accounts and instalment credit which ranged from 10 per cent to a maximum 54 per cent a year on the smallest purchase. BLOT ON DEMOCRACY "Almost without exception Canadians believe that interest rates of 20, 25 and 30 per cent per year should not be allowed... it's a blot on democracy for our parliament to allow the interest rates that are applied today in many instances." Mr. Argue said that if the Commons did not want to adopt his measure now, it should refer the whole matter to a committee for study. He also urged the government to consider providing alternate sources of consumer credit. Chartered banks should develop their small loans business. Mr. Argue said his bill would cover the field of consumer credit through instalment buying, finance company loans and the like. In 1956, the finance companies had "wept crocodile tears" when the former Liberal government limited the rates they could charge on loans up to \$1,500 to two per cent a month on the first \$300, one per cent a month on the next \$700 and half of one per cent on balances between \$1,000 and \$1,500. This was equivalent to a monthly rate of 1.27 per cent on a \$1,500 loan. Yet in 1957 profits of finance companies had risen by 37 per cent. The big instalment credit rates were not charged by ordinary businessmen. Most small merch-

May Begin Soon On Memorial

OTTAWA (CP)—Works Minister Green indicated Friday construction may start soon on a new national war memorial in Ottawa. He mentioned it in the Commons in giving a list of projects included in his department's "immediate planning program looking to the very near future." The first included a winter port at Pointe au Pere, Que., costing \$3,000,000. A new national war memorial was planned some years ago to commemorate those who died in the Second World War. The present national war memorial in Ottawa, unveiled in 1939, was designed as a First World War memorial. Among other planned buildings in his list, for which no cost estimates were given: a building at St. John's, Nfld., to house unemployment insurance and family allowance offices and a Montreal veterans affairs department building.
