Singular Accident.—A curious accident happened at Mr. R. T. Holmar's barn last Friday afternoon, says the Agriculturalist. A cow attempted to take a mouthful of hay from a horse, when the latter bit about four inches of the cow's tongue. The cow, a very valuable animal, and the only milch cow Mr. Holmar possessed, had to be destroyed in consequence of the mishap.

Died Abroad.—Through a telegram received on Wednesday last, by his brother, Mr. A. J. McLaine, of the P. E. I. R., we regret to learn of the death, at New Westminster, British Columbia, of Hugh McLaine, a native of North River, this Island. The deceased was a young man of excellent character, and his many friends here will learn of his death with feelings of profound regret.

Police Court.—This morning Margaret McLeod, Flora McLaine and Agnes McLaine appeared before His Honor charged with keeping a house of ill fame. Seven witnesses were examined. His Honor thought that their testimony substantiated the charge, and sentenced each one of the defendants to six months' imprisonment with hard labor. One drunk was fined \$3 or 14 days.

Poaching.—The Agriculturalist calls the attention of the government to the amount of poaching going on at Dunk River, one of the reserved salmon streams of the Province, and says there are some desperate characters among the assailants. Mr. McBride, one of the wardens, was severely injured lately by coming in contact with a porcupine, while engaged in his official duties. He was struck over the eye with a sling slung in the hands of one of the law-breakers referred to, and is still suffering from the effects of the blow.

The Butter Case.—This morning Fred Bevan appeared before R. R. Fitzgerald, Esq., J. P., charged with the larceny of a tub of butter from St. Dunstan's College. The tub of butter found on Bevan's premises was produced in court and identified by Mrs. W. H. Leonard, of Cornwall, as one of four she sold St. Dunstan's College on the 10th of October. Miss Wright, housekeeper at the College, testified to the purchase of the four tubs of butter from Mrs. Leonard, and to the subsequent theft of one of them by some unknown person. Other witnesses were also examined, but their evidence did not throw any new light on the subject. Bevan was remanded until to-morrow.

Released.—The schooner Ocean Queen was released on Friday last, on payment of four hundred dollars by her owners, T. A. Langford & Sons, of Gloucester, at the hands of Consular Agent Carlton. As intimated already in the EXAMINER, the vessel was seized for alleged infractions of customs and treaty regulations while under a former ownership. The offence is said to have been committed in the summer of 1889. All that time one Capt. Collins was master. He was ashore at Souris sick for several weeks during the fishing season. While there, the vessel was out fishing in charge of another party, Capt. Collin, it will be remembered, is the individual who after going home last fall accused some statements to appear in the Gloucester paper finding fault with a prominent business man, a countryman of his own who has prospered outside of the United States.

Sudden Death.—We regret to hear of the death of Mr. John Coyle, an old and respected resident of this city. The sad event occurred at his residence, Dorchester Street east, early this morning. Mr. Coyle attended service in St. Dunstan's Cathedral yesterday, and, we understand, went to bed last night apparently in his usual health. About six o'clock this morning, he awoke, and asked Mrs. Coyle to get up. Shortly after she left the bed Mrs. Coyle noticed her husband rise up slightly, clasp his hands to his head, and fall back again on the pillow. B-coming alarmed she rapped on the wall for his son who lives in the other half of the house. When the latter arrived on the scene a few minutes later he found his father dying, and hurried off for a doctor. When he returned however, the poor man was dead. The cause of death was undoubtedly heart disease. Mr. Coyle has been in the employ of His Honor Judge Young for upwards of forty-seven years, and was much liked by his employer.

Ottawa Notes.

OTTAWA, Nov. 23. Canadian malsters are asking for increased duty on malt, to enable them to supply the British Columbia market now controlled by western American firms. It is reported that two or three additional victims of leprosy in Cape Breton have recently been removed to Tracadie lazaretto. Cables from London state that Canadian Agent Saunders is making with encouraging success in reference to markets for Canadian eggs and poultry. The Indian Department anticipates no trouble as to Canadian Indians being affected by the present alleged rising on the American side of the line. A special to the Toronto Globe states that although Canadian securities, in common with all others, suffered slightly by the recent financial crisis, they are coming up rapidly to their normal value.

Halifax Notes.

HALIFAX, Nov. 23. The steamer Canada, of the National Line, arrived yesterday morning short of coal. Captain Robinson reports having experienced most tempestuous weather and took 21 days on the passage from London. She proceeded, after coaling, to New York. The steamer Caspian from Liverpool via St. John's Newfoundland, and the Nova Scotian from Baltimore, arrived to-day. Hon. Robert Bond arrived from St. John's to-day. He refused to state his mission, but denied absolutely the truth of the statement in a despatch from St. John's as to his object. The Government has no intention to respond to the bait act either as regards the French or Americans, and certainly not as a quid pro quo for the arrangement of the French shore question. The act is to be enforced as rigorously as ever against both nationalities.

A Big Failure.

CHICAGO, ILL., Nov. 23. W. L. Prettymann, banker, closed the bank doors on Saturday morning, and in the afternoon made an assignment to Charles P. Johnson; also, made assignees of the North Davison Lumber Co., one of the largest lumber firms in the city in which Prettymann was the heaviest stockholder. The assets and liabilities of the two concerns and Prettymann's estate will reach \$2,000,000. Johnson said the reason for the assignment was the present tight money market and the effect on the North Davison Lumber Co., which had closed business speculations with the bank.

SPRINGFIELD, MASS., Nov. 23. The Harvard eleven defeated the Yale team here on Saturday afternoon, 12 to 0, in one of the most brilliant games in the history of football. Both teams played like blood-hounds. There were present 15,000 spectators.

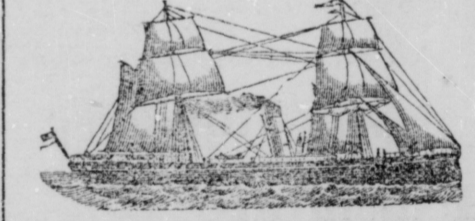

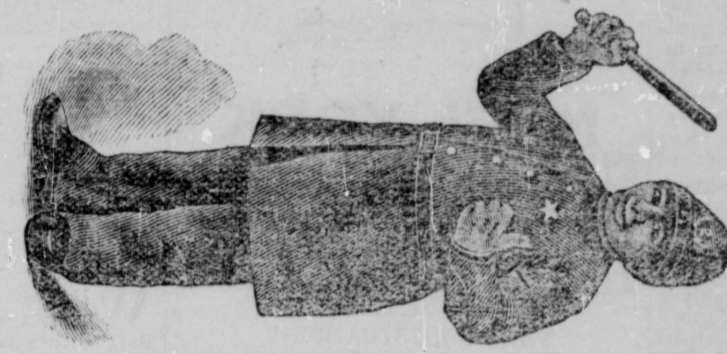
