TEMPERANCE.—The monthly public meeting under the joint management of the two temperance societies of the village of Souris, came off in McDonald's Hall on Wednesday evening last. The programme of the occasion did not quite come up to expectations, as none of the speakers whose names had been announced beforehand put in an appearance. The recitations given by the children, however, were loudly applauded. After an earnest temperance appeal from the chairman, Rev. John Goldsmith, the taking up of the collection and the singing of "God be with you till we meet again" (which will be some time next month, it is presumed) the meeting dispersed.

FIRE.—On Thursday morning about half past five o'clock, the platform in front of the Souris railway station was discovered to be on fire. The engine whistle sounded the alarm which promptly brought the railway hands to the spot. The fire was extinguished after it had burned about 30 feet of the platform, and just in time to save the station.

About 3 o'clock in the afternoon of the same day while Master Rowan Cameron was passing along the sidewalk, he discovered smoke issuing from an upstairs window in the dwelling house of Mr. L. E. Shaw, watch maker. He at once apprised the inmates, who succeeded in quenching the fire inside, but not until it had burned a carpet and some wearing material. If this fire had not been detected in the nick of time, the probability is, with the strong northerly breeze that was blowing to help it along, the principal part of the village would have been reduced to ashes. People cannot be too careful in guarding against fires.

SPECIAL DESPATCHES TO THE EXAMINER.

On the Home Stretch.

OTTAWA, July 30.

Hon. D. Ferguson and Father Burke of P. E. Island, passed through here yesterday, en route for home from the North-west. Father Burke, who visited the Catholic crofter's settlement at Moosomin was delighted by the prosperity apparent and was persuaded by the crofter settlers to present a petition to the Government asking that in view of recent legislation granting them with other original settlers the right to take second homesteads, that the Government endeavor to secure for them land adjacent to what they now occupy and thus enable them to have their farms compact.

They report an immense immigration into the Northwest. They left for Montreal last evening to join the rest of the party on the way home.

There was a terrific rainstorm here yesterday forenoon and afternoon. Lightning struck the Wellington Market and stopped the electric light and street railway machinery. Trees were blown down and great damage done to standing grain.
