THE PUMPING STATION.

SOME comments have been made upon the fact that it is proposed to build a pumping station, in connection with our sewerage system, upon the eastern border of Government Pond. We are informed by Mr. Thorpe, the engineer in charge, that this site was selected by Mr. Coffin, C. E., under whose orders the sewerage system is being constructed, as the best from the engineering point of view that can be obtained. Mr. Thorpe assures us, moreover, that there will be no bad smell about the premises,—that the pump will be deep in the earth and that the sewage will be conveyed through the sewerage pipes to a point whence it will flow by gravitation into the harbor. All that will be visible above ground is a small brick building which, he says, will not be in any sense either an eye-sore or a nuisance. The land has been expropriated but the price has not yet been agreed to; and if the sum asked for it should be deemed excessive, the matter will be submitted to arbitration.

Upon the other hand, we beg to submit that the site in question is in full view of one of the principal approaches to the city, and the little brick building, although well proportioned, is not likely to be highly ornamental or attractive to the public. It is manifest that Government Pond may easily be so improved and beautified as to be a place of popular resort in summer as well as in the winter and it is highly probable that a future generation (if not the present) may desire to make it such, and be prevented from doing so by reason of this pumping station. If the site of the station were placed a little north of McLean's machine shop and foundry it would be out of sight of the passing public; the land for it could be obtained for a smaller price; and plans for the future improvement of Government Pond and vicinity would not be in any way obstructed. From the citizen's point of view we should prefer the adoption of this latter site. While we have no desire to interfere with the designs of the engineer, who is doing that which he believes to be most advantageous for the city, we hope that he will give the site indicated by THE EXAMINER some consideration before finally deciding upon the position of the pumping station.

—Mail and Empires: The term "the growing time," which the Liberals apply to the present period in Canada's history, is applicable to the industry fostered by the National Policy, and also to the expenditures of the present Federal Administration. There is no credit and a good deal of discredit due the powers at Ottawa for the existence of the present conditions.

—It is pointed out by the Moncton Times that if the object of Canada's preferential tariff was to increase the market for British goods in Canada to the exclusion of the foreign, it has so far been a magnificent failure. The returns show that the imports of British goods into this country are decreasing, while the imports from other countries, notably the United States, are increasing.

—It is to be noticed that the Guardian has corrected its correction of THE EXAMINER's statement as to the fruit shipments. The fact is THE EXAMINER's statement was strictly correct as far as it went. We only regret that the name of Mr. Sharpe was not included with those who were instrumental in obtaining and selecting a shipment for the P. E. Island Fruit Growers' Association. Mr. Sharpe has been one of the most active of the promoters of fruit growing in the province and it is needless to say that THE EXAMINER would not if we knew it deprive him of one iota of the credit that is his due.

FISHING SITUATION SERIOUS.

What Newfoundland Wants --The Blaine-Bond Agreement.

OTTAWA, Nov 11—The Canadian commissioners are in Washington, and are again grappling with the questions referred to them and to their American colleagues. Sufficient information has leaked out during the past few weeks, to indicate how wide apart on some subjects are the two parties to the negotiations. The Atlantic fisheries question was discussed at Quebec, the Americans pointing out that, friendly understanding between the two countries should be reached, and the suggestion was thrown out that it would be to Canada's advantage to concede the bonding privilege, especially since the United States had control of Cuba and Porto Rico, in which Nova Scotia had such direct interest. If there be one thing that Sir Louis Davies ought to get rid of it is the air of superiority which he has assumed since he became a knight. The American commissioners could not get him to discuss the Atlantic fisheries only in a general way; there was nothing of give and take about him, and it is said the United States representatives left Quebec greatly disgusted with Sir Louis' attitude. Thus, the outlook for an agreement on this question is by no means rosy. Indeed, Sir James Winter himself, on his return to Newfoundland, predicted failure in reaching a settlement. Now comes the serious side of the question. Information has been received here that in the event of failure to agree on this important matter the colony of Newfoundland will ask permission of the Imperial Government to make special treaty, or convention with the United States. A Maritime Province man who is in the city said to your correspondent that, under all the circumstances, he did not see how the Home Government could refuse the request of Newfoundland. Eight years ago the ancient colony was permitted to arrange a special treaty with the United States known as the Blaine-Bond convention. This proposed treaty had almost reached the point of ratification when Sir Charles Tupper heard of it, and with that promptness which always characterized his career as High Commissioner he was successful in securing the hanging up of the treaty. The ground taken by the Canadian Government at that time was that it had declared its policy to be that no commercial arrangements with a foreign country should be entered into by Canada which would involve tariff discrimination against the Mother Country, a principle which had received the approval of her Majesty's Government. It would be difficult, said the Dominion Government, to induce the people of Canada to continue to believe in the importance of that principle as a safeguard to the interests of the Empire if Great Britain were to make a convention for Newfoundland, under which the United States was able to discriminate directly against Canada.

Representations of this character had weight. The Blaine-Bond convention, much to the disgust of the Whiteway Government, was, as stated, hung up, and it has remained suspended from that day to this.
