A LONDON DESPATCH SAYS:—Cardinal Newman is in the city, and it is rumored that his errand is to see Mr. Gladstone regarding the mission of Lord Erington to Rome. The *Standard* declares that Lord Erington is positively acting as British agent at the Vatican under circumstances which seem to leave no doubt that his position is an accredited one.

The schooner "Sylvanus McDonald," Captain Paoli, arrived from Pictou at this port last evening, bringing with her the boiler for the new steamer "Heather Belle." The boiler was cast at the New Glasgow Iron Works, and is represented to be a first-class one. Captain McLean, of the old steamer, had the boiler in charge, and, owing to his careful management it was landed here without damage or breakage.

A VALUABLE horse belonging to Mr. McLellan, five mile house, was accidentally lost yesterday afternoon. It appears that Mr. McLellan was going home from Market, and that as he was driving on to the Ferry boat, the horse took fright and, becoming unmanageable, backed himself over the boat into the water. He instantly disappeared and was not seen again. The wagon and pieces of the harness were recovered this morning.

THE MISSING MAN.

Conclusion of Coroner's Inquest

THE VERDICT OF THE JURY.

PAUL GILLIS, (sworn)—I don't remember seeing Alfred McGregor on the night of Friday, May 18th, last, at my house. Being reminded of it, I do remember him, and George Farquharson and Mr. Cameron, an insurance agent, being in my place some time through the day; but before dark. I remembered this when I was reminded of it; though I did not know the deceased personally. I saw him at my place several times before; but I did not know his name. I never saw him under the influence of liquor, nor can I say that I ever saw him drinking intoxicating liquor. As regards the night in question, he might have been in my place; but I can't say. I know I have given him drinks, on more occasions than one; but what kind I am unable to say. On the several occasions I saw him, I never noticed any difference in him. I do not remember anything about his clothing.

To the Jury—I don't remember his taking anything away with him from my place that night at all.

CHARLES HASZARD, (Sworn)—I saw the deceased last probably two or three days before his disappearance. He told me he was going to see his mother. This was after his return from the United States. I was acquainted with him before he left the Island. He appeared all right and in his usual condition. I had no particular conversation with him, but I remember his telling me he intended going up to New Glasgow to see his mother. At that time he was on his way to Lot 49. I met him on the road next day and passed the remark that he had a long walk before him, and I never saw him afterwards.

CLEMENT BENOIT, (Sworn)—I saw the deceased two or three days after his arrival from Colorado. He was into my place one market day, Tuesday, for his dinner. I did not see him afterwards. It was a market day either Tuesday or Friday, but I think it was Tuesday. He was perfectly sober and appeared to be all right. I think he was always a sober man.

GEORGE FARQUHARSON, (sworn)—I saw deceased last on Friday, May 18th last, over on Southport Wharf at about ten or eleven o'clock, a. m. He was looking for a house, and he went back with me. We examined the house together, he talked of the part that would suit him best, and if he got it at a reasonable rent, he thought he would do well in Southport. We then returned to town; that would be twelve or one o'clock. I parted from him at the market, but I met him that evening again about five or six o'clock near Baldwin's Store. I was with him then till seven or half-past seven. He walked down to end of Ferry Wharf with me where we separated, I returning to Southport. He told me he wanted to see Mr. Theo. Farquharson about the house at Southport that night, consequently he would not go across, as he had business to keep him in town.

Here the Coroner read evidence of John Anderson to witness in which he swears he saw deceased coming up off slip, evidently from Southport.

The Witness—I am positive he did not go over to Southport in the same boat with me. We parted at the head of the wharf, and Mr. Anderson met him as he left me. He appeared all right on that occasion and did not seem to be the worse of liquor. I can't say I saw him take liquor that evening. We went into Union House together, and I think he drank some ale or lager.

To the Jury.—Mr. Anderson went over in same boat with me. As to the house at Southport, we agreed to offer Theo. Farquharson a certain rent. He wanted to know if I could not come to town next day, Saturday. Nearly all the time that we were together in town, we walked up and down the street. I noticed nothing peculiar or different in his demeanour. When I left him, I said I did not think I could return on Saturday as I would be busy. Changing my mind I came across on purpose to see him, but could not find him. I inquired for him, and could hear nothing of him. I also inquired for him on the following Monday and Tuesday. It was thought he had gone up to New Glasgow. If he did not get the house he was after, he talked of going out to his brother who lives in one of the States. He wore dark clothes, black overcoat, soft felt hat, with a cord around it. I saw the hat that was found near Pownal Wharf, and I thought it was the hat McGregor wore. I noticed the watch chain.

The Coroner showed witness watch and chain found on body.

The witness—I could not swear positively what kind of a chain he had, but I was under the impression that it was a metal one. It was three minutes to seven when he looked at his watch. I don't remember what it was like.

JOHN ANDERSON, (recalled.) To the Jury.—Until I heard the last witness I thought deceased was coming from Southport that night. I saw him coming up from the gate on wharf. I believed he was coming from Southport. I saw him there several times. I don't remember his crossing with his wife that evening. I was under the impression it was the 7 o'clock boat.

THOMAS FARQUHARSON, (sworn)—I have not seen the deceased since he returned from Colorado.

To the Jury—I probably might have said to Mr. Dickinson that he went over the wharf. If I said so, it was because the man was missing, and as he was in Charlottetown that night, I thought it likely he went over the wharf. I don't remember whether I made the remark before or after the hat was found, in short, I don't remember making it at all. So far as I know he was a sober man.

JOHN MCGREGOR, (sworn)—I heard several rumors as to the cause of his death, but I paid no heed to them. I had no suspicion myself that he went over the wharf. It was my opinion he had left the Island. I heard that his friends were dragging for his body last Sabbath. I heard the hat was found before this. My reason for supposing he was off the Island was, that he had been up to New Glasgow to see his friends, and he told them that if he did not get the house in Southport, he would go away. I did not see the hat, nor could I tell where it was found. My son thought he

could identify it, but changed his opinion, as he heard that the cord on the hat was drawn in, thus making it smaller. MARSH E. FLENN, (recalled.) To the Jury.—When I heard the man was missing, I was under the impression that he had gone over the wharf, and this was I think the public impression. I could mention several cases of a similar nature that have already happened here, and this would, I suppose, lead the public to come to the same conclusion in the present case. His friends came to see me about some drags with which to search the river, and I gave them the necessary information to procure these drags.

This concluded the evidence.

After a short deliberation, the Jury came to the conclusion "that the deceased, Alfred McGregor came to his death by drowning."
