DROWNED IN A RESERVOIR.—The 14-year old son of the late Dr. Steeves, of Moncton was drowned in the cotton factory reservoir at that place shortly before dusk on Thursday evening. It appears that Steeves and another lad named Porteous were paddling about in the water on a piece of timber, and the former fell off where the water was beyond his depth. Steeves came up three times, but the boy did not give the alarm until too late. Just before going down the last time young Steeves cried out, "good bye" to his companion. The body has been recovered.

THE PROVINCIAL SYNOD.—The Provincial Synod resumed its session at Montreal on Thursday. The forenoon was devoted to procedure and minutes. Memorials from Toronto and Montreal re the Jesuits' Estates Act were presented. Memorials were also presented for special service for use in prisons; for defining the relations of the Provincial to the Synods; for Uniformity in Sunday lessons; and re the use of the revised version of the Scriptures. The deputations from the United States were presented and read addresses. A missionary meeting was held in the evening at which addresses were given by the Bishops of Huron and Algoma.

MORE MUSIC ON THE SQUARE.—We are requested to state that the Citizens' Colored Band will perform on Queen Square, next Tuesday, the 17th inst., at 8 o'clock p. m. They beg to say that, owing to insufficient capital, they have not been able to engage a teacher. But they want to show the citizens that they are able and willing to learn if they had sufficient cash to carry out their plans. The music which will be presented they have learned almost entirely without a teacher. Their intention is to ask the people for a liberal collection to raise funds for securing some person to instruct them through the winter months. They expect a generous contribution.

SHOWING UP WELL.—C. D. Anderson and A. Simper, of this city, owners of the La Provencia mine at San Pedro, have let the contract for sinking fifty feet in the mine. The contractors are now working on it, and the mine is showing up splendidly. They will commence shipping ore in a few weeks, first hauling it here, and thence by cars to either the Pueblo or Socorro smelter. The vein is two feet wide and can be traced on the surface at least five hundred feet. It runs heavy in silver and galena, with enough gold to pay the smelting and other necessary expenses. It is the prediction of the *Citizen*, and of those who have seen some of the specimens, that the La Provencia will prove one of the valuable mines of San Pedro.—*Abouquerque (N.M.) Citizen*. The Mr. Anderson referred to in the foregoing paragraph is an Islander and has many friends in this city. We trust that the mine in which he is interested may pay out well.

Islanders to the Front WITH THE BIG GUNS.

They Win Both Shifts And Many Individual Prizes.

QUEBEC, Sept. 13.

The Islanders have been more than usually successful this year. They have won both the "A." and "B." shifts, in seven minutes and nineteen seconds, and in four minutes and twenty-three seconds respectively.

Lieut.-Col. Moore wins 2nd prize in the officers firing competition. The Islanders win first aggregate in the 64-pounder competition. They also win second and third aggregate in the 40-pounder, as well as first and second grand aggregates in the 64-pounder and 40-pounder combined.

Gunner Scantlebury of No. 1 Battery wins 1st individual prize and badge in the 64-pounder, and Corporal Whear, of No. 2 Battery wins 2nd prize in the same match. Sergt. Offer, of No. 1 Battery wins the 2nd individual prize in the 40-pounder, and Sergt. Dover, of No. 2 Battery, ties for the third place in the same match.

Several other smaller individual prizes have been won. The team has been highly complimented on its success, and is greatly admired by all on the ground.

The Great London Strike.

LONDON, Sept. 13.

The joint committee appointed to consider the proposals of the strikers have agreed that the wages demanded by the dock laborers shall be conceded, the advance to take effect on November 4th. The Lord Mayor, at a conference with the directors of the dock companies to-day, gave assurance that the men are now ready to resume work on Monday. In view of the approaching end of the dock laborers strike the lightmen are seeking to resume work.

French Politics.

PARIS, Sept. 14.

Despite the refusal of the Prefect of the Seine to receive Boulanger's declaration of candidacy for member of the Chamber of Deputies, placards have been posted in Montmartre announcing that he would be a candidate. The police have torn down the placards and arrested the men that posted them.

Shot and Killed.

NEW YORK, Sept. 13.

A. W. Gresswein, the millionaire tool manufacturer, was shot and killed in his office on John Street this afternoon by Christian Deig, whom he had beaten in a patent suit. Deig demanded money to enter the old man's home, which was refused. Gresswein was 69 years old.

A Disastrous Collision.

OTTAWA, Sept. 13.

The str. Rothesay, loaded with excursionists, collided with a tug boat on the St. Lawrence near Prescott last night. The tug boat was sunk and three men drowned. The Rothesay was run aground and all her passengers safely landed.

They were Acquitted.

OTTAWA, Sept. 13.

Andrews Hendricks, May Hendricks and Mrs. Cooper, who were put on trial here to-day for the murder of a woman named Kelly, last winter, were acquitted, the Judge declining to allow the case to go to the jury.

The Shamrocks shut the Bangors out to-day by a score of 7 to 0. Abbey pitched for the home nine and Ruby for the Bangors.

Rumors from various quarters state that a large number of Nihilists have recently arrived in Denmark. In consequence of these reports, the authorities are taking extraordinary precautions for the Czar during his coming visit to Copenhagen, as it is feared an attempt upon his life is intended.

Nothing remains of the cartridge factory, at Antwerp, in which the explosion occurred on Friday last. The village of Austruwell, situated 2,600 metres from where the factory stood, and which consisted of about forty houses, has vanished. According to the official report, 135 persons were killed, 20 are missing, 100 seriously injured and 200 slightly injured.

It is a perilous thing to umpire a game of baseball in some parts of the neighboring union. During the progress of a game at Charlotte, N. C., a young man who resented a decision of the umpire felled him to the ground by the blow of a heavy bat.
