AN EASY CONTRACT

South had to be extremely shortsighted to lose his game contract in the following deal.

West dealer. Both sides vulnerable.

♠ A 9 5 4 2	♥ Q 10 7	♦ K 8 7 5	♣ J 9 5 4 2
♠ 8 7 3	♥ K 6 4	♦ A K 10 6	♣ K Q 10 7 3
♠ K Q 10 7 3	♥ A 8 6 4	♦ A J 10	♣ A Q
♠ J 9 5 4 2	♥ 8 6 4	♦ 8 7 3	♣ K 8 7 5

The bidding:
West 1♦ Pass East 2♠ Pass South 4♠ Pass

West should have overcalled South's two-spade bid with three clubs, paving the way to a good sacrifice contract against a spade game. This, however, is only the academic view; the fact was that, because of South's error in the play, East-West did not have to sacrifice.

West laid down the king and ace of clubs. Declarer ruffed and drew the outstanding trumps, then
