Duty Does Not Apply To Canada

(C.P. By Guardian's Special Wire) OTTAWA, June 29—Restoration of duties on potatoes imported into Great Britain, announced today in London, will not apply to Canada, officials of the agriculture department said tonight.

For several years an embargo has been in effect in the United Kingdom on Canadian potatoes due to the danger of the Colorado beetle. Likewise there is an embargo on British potatoes in this country on account of the powdery mildew.

ROAD-BUILDING GIVES UP GOLD

FALL RIVER, N.S. June 29—(CP)—Highway workers engaged in paving this section of the Halifax-Truro road have "struck it rich."
