Continued from page 1. put up \$209,000,000 in 1951, representing 25 per cent of the total, compared with \$222,000,000 or 27 per cent of the total in 1950.

Individual and miscellaneous loan sources provided \$152,000,000 in 1951 and \$50,000,000 in 1950, representing respectively four per cent and six per cent of the housing outlay.

The report said that in 1951, for the first time in the post-war period, the volume and value of gross institutional mortgage loans declined. A total of \$7,499 mortgage loans with a value of \$431,000,000 were approved last year, compared with 7,550 loans in 1950 with a value of \$523,000,000.

Prices now are a little better than the average for 1951, considered a fairly normal year in the livestock business.

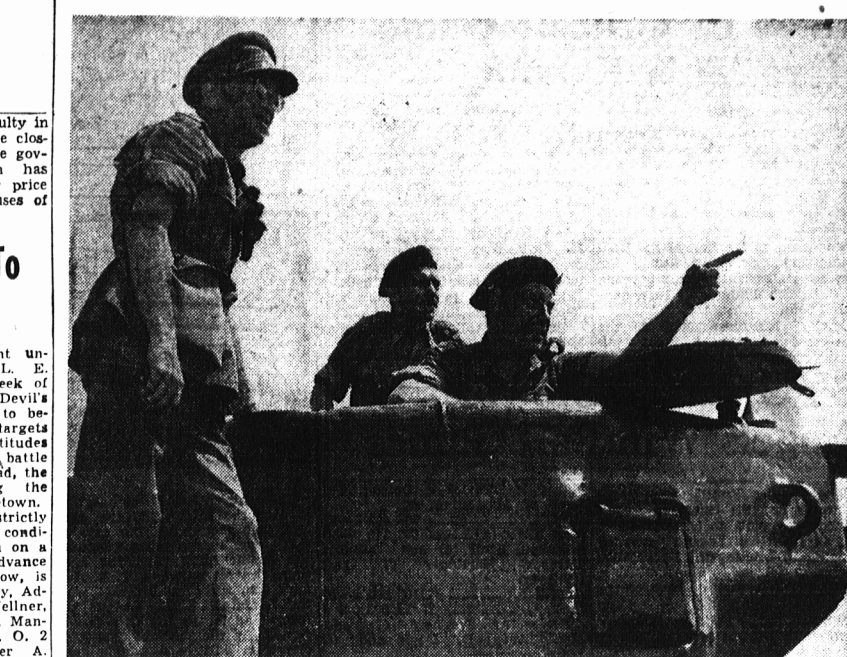
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Sherman Tanks In Action
