

Canada Exports Rise 19 Per Cent

OTTAWA (CP) — First-half exports 19 per cent higher than last year were reported Wednesday by the Dominion Bureau of Statistics. Trade Minister Winters declared the performance "exceptional."

A boom in sales to the United States carried total exports for the first six months of 1966 to \$4,787,000,000 from \$4,019,000,000.

Almost \$600,000,000 of the jump came with shipments to the U.S., notably in automotive products, forest products, metals and minerals such as potash and asbestos.

Mr. Winters said in a statement the growth is "all the more remarkable in view of the capacity limitations under which segments of Canadian industry now are operating."

He added that the growth has to be maintained to keep ahead of imports.

Many of the same strains that were making the U.S. a choice market for Canadian producers were being felt in Canada and causing an import boom.

FIGURES INCOMPLETE.

Although import figures to the end of June are not yet available, preliminary calculations show that appreciable slackening in exports during the rest of the year will quickly reverse the narrow favorable balance in commodity trade.

To the end of May imports were running 18 per cent higher than last year, with the dollar volume less than one per cent behind exports. Six-month sales to the U.S. were 25 per cent

Last available figures on trade under the new automotive program showed that sales of vehicles and vehicle parts were running almost 400 per cent ahead of 1965.

Sales to the United Kingdom were down only three per cent despite the British seamen's strike and the dock strike in St. Lawrence River ports.

The dock strike did not prevent total overseas exports from climbing 10 per cent, reflecting wheat movements to Communist countries and better sales to Western Europe and Japan.

Mr. Winters said new austerity measures in Britain dampen some sales prospects, but removal Nov. 1 of a 10-per-cent surcharge on manufactured goods should compensate for some products.

Elsewhere, he said, portents remain bright.

Says Molgat Has Invitation

WINNIPEG (CP)—The Free Press says Manitoba Liberal Gil Molgat has been asked by Prime Minister Pearson to join the federal cabinet. Mr. Molgat was not immediately available for comment.

Mr. Teillet would then be appointed to the Senate to fill the vacancy created by the resignation of Senator T. A. Crean earlier this year.

The Free Press says one factor for delaying a decision by Mr. Molgat is the lack of an obvious successor as provincial Liberal leader.

"If Mr. Molgat decided to accept the federal offer, he would notify the Manitoba Liberal Association of his decision and a leadership convention would be called."

Mr. Molgat has led the Liberal party in Manitoba since 1961. In his last test at the polls in the June 23 Manitoba election, the party was beaten by the Progressive Conservative administration of Duff Roblin.

The Liberals added one seat and retained their position as the official opposition but the major opposition gains were made by the New Democratic Party.

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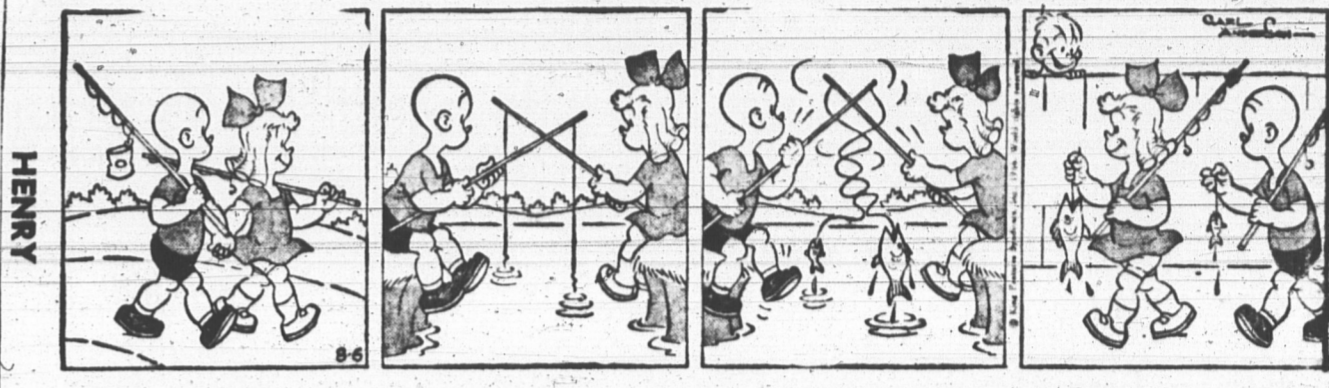
