WELCOME HOME.—Unsworth, Newsome, and Cook, the winners of the Massey-Harris trophy, returned from St John last evening bringing with them the prize they so handily won. At the station, notwithstanding the late hour at which the train arrived and the unfavorable weather, a great crowd assembled to give the victorious racers a welcome home. As soon as they landed the three were escorted to a barouche in waiting in which they were driven up Water and Queen Streets, thence to their respective homes. The barouche was preceded by about 150 firemen, cyclists, etc., bearing torches, with the Citizens Band in advance playing appropriate airs. As the procession left the station cheer after cheer went up for the victorious racers, and the cheering was repeated at their homes and along the line of the procession.

NEWS NOTES.

Charles M. Dickinson has been appointed United States Consul at Constantinople.
One young British nobleman is a groom in a Johannesburg livery stable, while a Duke's brother-in-law is bossing a gang of blacks in a mine outside the town.

The New Glasgow Enterprise says symptoms of Klondicittist have appeared at Bovlston, Guys-boro county, and that Charles R. Atwater, of that place, announces his intention of closing out his present business, and, when the proper season arrives, to take his departure for the Yukon regions.

Following the report that Emperor William intends to visit the Queen at Balmoral comes the statement that the Emperor is anxious that the Queen should visit him either at Coblenz or Potsdam in April.

Josephine's rouge box, Napoleon's pocketknife and the map he used during the 1806 campaign in Prussia, together with a wooden eagle whittled by Napoleon III, when he was a prisoner at Ham, are among the relics bequeathed by Baron Larrey to the Carnavalet Museum in Paris.

Bismarck's brain, according to the estimate from external measurements made by Herr Ammon, an anthropologist, and the sculptor who made the iron Chancellor's bust, probably weighs 1,897 grammes, in which case it is the heaviest on record. Cuvier's brain weighed 1,830 grammes; Byron's, 1,807; Kants, 1,650; and Schiller's, 1,580. The average weight of the brain for an intelligent European is 1,380 grammes.

Ireland's claims upon the attention of the Royal family are being supported by the London Genealogical Magazine, which traces the descent of the Queen to Turrough O'Connor, who was King of Ireland in the twelfth century, and shows that her Majesty is twenty-ninth in descent from the great Irish kings. The assumption of the title of Queen of Ireland and the establishment of a Royal residence in the Emerald isle may not be long delayed, and the innovation would surely do much to improve the prevailing feeling of the Irish people towards the British crown.
