**The Markets.**

**BOSTON MARKET.**

FISH.—According to Hatheway & Co.'s report, P. E. Island Mackerel have been selling at \$11 and \$13 per brl., unculled; \$10 for No. 3; \$11 and \$12 for No. 2; and \$14 and \$15 for No. 1. Dry Codfish are selling at \$2.50 and \$2.75 per quintal for large fish, but it is not easy to get the outside price.

PORK.—Dealers report a continued good demand for Pork, and prices are well maintained. Mess commands \$16.50 and \$17; clear at \$18 and \$18.50; and backs \$19 and \$19.25 per brl.

SMOKED HAMS.—Prices continue steady at 12 and 13 cents per lb. including small and large.

LARD.—There have been further sales of Western and Boston at 7 1/2 and 8 cents per lb. Our quotations are for large lots. Small lots range higher.

EGGS.—There has been a good demand for strictly fresh eggs, which are scarce, but other kinds are dull and easy. A large quantity of hatched stock is arriving, and for such there is not much call. Nova Scotia and P. E. Island eggs sell at 26 and 27 cents.

POTATOES.—Receipts of potatoes are liberal, but with a good trade, there is very little accumulation and prices are fairly maintained. Best Eastern command 53 to 55c, and Northern at 50 to 55c. OATS.—The market for oats has been quiet and the tendency of prices to easier rates, but no material change has taken place. The sales of No. 1 and extra white have been at 35 1/2 to 37c; No 2 white at 34 1/2 to 35c; No. 3 white at 33 1/2 to 34c; and mixed at 32 to 34c per bushel.

**Fire.**

ST. GEORGE, Nov. 20.

At 12.30 last night the store of Henry Murphy, liquor agent for St. George under the Scott Act, was discovered to be on fire, and in a short time the flames made such headway as to prevent the saving of its contents. The dwelling house of James Bradley, on Main Street, caught, and was entirely consumed, also the workshop of T. Barry, carpenter. It looked at one time as if the village would all go, but luckily the fire was got under control.

**France and China.**

PARIS, Nov. 20.

Le Paris says that Gen. Briere de Lisle, commander of the French forces in Tonquin, telegraphs that the Chinese had made a vigorous attack on the French gunboats Eucalaire and Tromber, as they were proceeding along the River Claire, after revitalizing the garrisons at Tu Yenquan. One sailor was killed and eight wounded. Eighty thousand Chinese are coming down the Red River but he is ready to meet them.

**Sudden Death.**

WOODSTOCK, N. B., Nov. 20.

A sensation was caused this morning by the intelligence of the sudden death of James H. Jacques, customs officer. The deceased was attending to his official duties as usual yesterday, but this morning he was taken suddenly ill and died in a few minutes. The probable cause was heart disease. He was much respected.

**A Respite.**

OTTAWA, Nov. 20.

Mrs. Bontel, who was to have been hanged in Quebec at eight o'clock this morning, was respited for eight days. The sentence will likely be commuted to imprisonment for life.

**Financial Plans.**

LONDON, Nov. 20.

In the Commons to-day, Mr. Gladstone stated that the Government was submitting financial plans regarding Egypt, to the Powers, and was therefore unable to disclose them.

**Breach of Promise.**

LONDON, Nov. 20.

The Fortescue-Garmoye breach of promise case was begun to-day. The court room was crowded.

**The Cholera.**

NAPLES, Nov. 20.

Complete official returns of cholera show that a little over forty per cent. of all cases have been fatal.
