## Gulf Grenadier Completes Trials

GEORGETOWN — The 128 foot steel trawler the Gulf Grenadier, the first steel trawler to be completely built at Georgetown by Bathurst Marine Ltd. underwent official sea trials off Georgetown Harbor yesterday between 10 a.m. and 3:15 p.m. The Gulf Grenadier will sail on Sunday for Fort Hawkesbury, N.S. where she will be hauled out on the marine railway to have launching plates removed and final painting done.

Official acceptance of the new trawler by her owners Gulf Garden Foods Ltd. will take place in the near future. The Gulf Grenadier was launched on Dec. 11 after having been christened earlier in the year by Mrs. Walter R. Shaw the wife of the premier of P.E.I.

**MODERN AIDS**  
The trawler is equipped with all modern navigational aids. Its electrical equipment includes radio telephones, navigational instruments and echo sounders which are used to detect schools of fish.

On her trials she handled well and has speed of 11.6 knots. She is powered by a Normo Diesel 700 horsepower motor. When engaged in fishing she will have a crew of 17 and will carry 1000 aluminum boxes to hold her cargo of fish. Her fish carrying capacity is approximately double that of the 94 foot trawlers which the company formerly built. She is under command of Captain C. Hache of Gulf Garden Foods and her commanding officer for her sea trials included: L. Fiskerstrand, chief engineer; W. Will, shipyard superintendent.
