### SITUATION IN CHINA.

Mild Punishment of the Murderers

LONDON, Nov. 20.—Dr. Morrison writing to the Times from Peking, Sunday, says:

"In communicating the punishment edict, dated Sian Fu, Nov. 12, to the foreign envoys, Li Hung Chang submits it as the final punishment the court is able to inflict and repeats the stereotyped plea of all Chinese plenipotentiaries, namely, that the emperor threatens himself and Prince Ching with severe punishment if they fail to induce the representatives of the powers to accept the compromise.

"The mildness of the sentences excites ridicule and strengthens the ministers in their determination to demand the death penalty. The punishments are illusory. Prince Tuan is merely banished to his home, and others undergo a merely nominal lowering of rank. Perpetual imprisonment means a life of honored retirement."

### Allies Capture Two Passes.

LONDON, Nov. 20.—Chinese official reports, says the Shanghai correspondent of the Standard, "state the allies have captured two passes leading from Chi Li into Shan Si. Herr Rnadpe, the German consul, has returned from Nankin. He reports that he asked the viceroy to permit foreign troops to ascend the Yang Tse Kiang and to stop sending supplies to Sian Fu."

### Persecution Continues.

LONDON, Nov. 20.—"The French consul here reports," says the Shanghai correspondent of the Daily News, "that severe persecutions of Catholic converts continue in the province of Kiang Si. Mr. Goodnow (U. S. consul) hears that the Protestants in the province of Chi Kiang are similarly persecuted. The governors of both provinces are Manchus and violently anti-foreign."

### Engagement With Boxers.

PARIS, Nov. 20.—Official advices from General Voyron, commander of the French troops in China, announce that international columns are occupying the tombs east and southwest of Peking. He reports a small engagement with the Boxers, in which they lost 100 killed, the foreign troops sustaining no casualties.

### Queen Honors Buller.

LONDON, Nov. 20.—The royal borough received Sir Redvers Buller with every mark of honor. The town fluttered with bunting, and the mayor formally welcomed him and Lady Audrey. The royal carriage awaited them, and they dined with the Queen and remained at the castle over night.

### GUERRILLA WARFARE.

British Keep Boers Moving.

LONDON, Nov. 20.—The guerilla warfare in South Africa has become less formidable. The centres of hostile operations in Dutch territory may have been multiplied, but the Boer commanders are thinning out from death, illness and desertions. The skirmishes recorded daily by Lord Roberts are petty affairs, in which scores of Boer combatants are engaged where formerly there were hundreds, and sometimes thousands. Consequently casualties are light and few prisoners are taken.

The British army is adapting itself to the altered conditions, and is gradually wearing out the energies of its persistent and obstinate foe. Where once there were divisions, with a complete staff organization there are now brigades and lightly equipped mobile columns are sent in pursuit of small bands of guerillas. Generals and staff officers are returning by every steamer from the Cape, and the entire British army is in process of re-organization for the special service which is now required. General Kelly-Kenny, who commanded the Sixth Division in the terrible march across the veldt, has been relieved from command at Bloemfontein and General Hunter has taken his place. Either Roberts or Kitchener is picking out men who have special capacity for fighting the Boers. The new tactics seem effective. The scattered bands of Boers are constantly harried and allowed no rest. Lines of column are strongly guarded and are not seriously menaced. The Boers are alert, but only able to operate on a small scale against outposts, and their cattle and horses are constantly taken from them, and here and there small squads are killed, wounded or taken prisoners. They have not had a single success in the last six weeks, and the sum of their losses is considerable. It is not strange that optimists are predicting the close of hostilities by the end of the year.
