(Top Record-Holder in Masters' Individual Championship Play)

North dealer. Neither side vulnerable.

NORTH
♠ A Q 6 3
♥ 5
♦ 10 6 3
♣ A K 8 7 4

EAST
♠ K 10 7 2
♥ K Q J 10

SOUTH

The bidding:
North East South West
1♣ 1♥ 1NT Pass
2♣ 2♦ 3NT

Opening lead—two of hearts. Anyone who has read a book on the play of the cards has met a group known as safety plays. The safety play is a preventive measure taken by the declarer to guard against an adverse distribution of the opponents' cards unfavorable to him.

The procedure which the cautious declarer uses to protect himself against possible bad luck is usually of a simple nature. He presupposes a bad break and, if it is controllable, takes appropriate steps.

Declarer permitted East to win the first two heart tricks, whereupon the king of diamonds was led. South could now see nine winners provided he could make five club tricks, in which case a diamond could be established for the ninth trick.

The clubs were not completely solid. There was danger that either opponent might have all four missing clubs. This threat could be taken care of easily enough if the clubs were cashed in the right order.

If, for example, East had the supposed four clubs a low club to the ace would make it a simple matter to trap his jack. But if West had the clubs it would be necessary to start the suit by playing the queen first and then following with two finesses.

The correct course to follow in this deal was strongly indicated by the bidding. East's hand was known to consist largely of hearts and diamonds. It was hardly possible, if the clubs were banked in one hand, for East to have them. Accordingly, the queen of clubs was cashed and when East showed out the ten was led. West covered with the jack which was taken by the ace.

A diamond from dummy drew the king from East and a diamond return. After cashing the ace of hearts declarer led a club and took the marked finesse to score nine tricks.

South goes down if, after winning the ace of diamonds, he plays a low club to dummy's ace. West's quires a club stopper, which prevents cashing the five club tricks necessary to make the hand.

West German Army Will Fall Short Of Goal

BONN (AP)—The parliamentary leader of Chancellor Konrad Adenauer's party announced Wednesday that the West German army will fall short of the 95,000 men promised the North Atlantic alliance by the end of the year.

Heinrich Krone of the Christian Democratic Union told a press conference lack of barracks for the new soldiers was to blame, not a shortage of volunteers.

Krone said Adenauer told his party Tuesday night that the first task of the new defence minister, Franz Josef Strauss, would be to break this news at the next meeting of the NATO council.

Adenauer fired the previous defence minister, Theodor Blank, Tuesday so that the rearmament plans could be completely revised because of the many difficulties that had arisen.

Krone said the Adenauer government is sticking to its plan to call up the first draftees next April 1.

There had been speculation that the new defence minister would postpone conscription because of the lack of barracks space and also to delay the draft—which is highly unpopular with many Germans—until after next summer's general election.
