

Mets Shut out Cubs 2-0; Cards Take Over Top Spot

Veteran Carl Willey's three hit pitching and rookie Ron Hunt's first major league home run brought New York Mets a 2-0 victory over Chicago's Cubs Wednesday, the Mets' first road victory of the season and their fifth in the last six games.

Bout Slated For June 27

LAS VEGAS (AP)—The rematch between heavy-weight champion Sonny Liston and Floyd Patterson will be fought at the Convention Centre here June 27, officials said Wednesday.

Liston won the championship from Patterson at Chicago last Sept. 25 by a knockout in two minutes, six seconds of the first round.

Al Bolan, vice-president of Championship Sports, Inc., which is promoting the rematch, said each fighter will get 30 per cent of the gate receipts and 20 per cent of the proceeds from nation-wide closed circuit television.

Liston now is in training at Lowry Air Force Base, Denver, Colo. Patterson is at Highland Mills, N.Y. They are expected to come here to wind up training a month before the fight. The rematch was originally set for Miami Beach April 4 but Liston contended he had hurt his knee swinging a golf club while posing for a photographer and the bout was delayed.

SCORES STUNNING UPSET

Vancouver's Tom Dinsley Wins First Gold Medal

SAO PAULO, Brazil (CP-AP)—Diver Tom Dinsley of Vancouver cracked the United States monopoly on aquatic championships at the Pan-American Games Wednesday with a stunning victory in the men's three-metre springboard diving. His victory gave Canada its first gold medal and two silver medals in women's diving and men's three-metre springboard diving.

"I had only hoped to win the bronze medal for third place," said the 19-year-old Canadian champion, competing in her first major international competition.

She finished second behind Barbara Ellen McAlister of the U.S.

Gary McMahon of Dartmouth, N.S., a physician who won the silver medal in individual free pistol shooting Tuesday, led the Canadian pistol team to a second-place finish Wednesday.

Wednesday, pulled ahead of the U.S. pair of Dick Gilbert, 19, and Ken Stitzberg, 18. And he stayed there, leaving Gilbert, a coach, and Stitzberg, a diver, to take the silver and bronze medals.

Mike Doig of Brandon, Man., Bill Hare of Ottawa and Fernand Lapointe of Quebec City were listed as other members of the Canadian team.

Dinsley, with his second dive, "Tears came to my eyes when I was playing the Canadian anthem as I got the gold medal," said Dinsley. "It was wonderful to hear that tune."

Dinsley also is entered in today's platform diving, but he said he feels his chances are slim because of limited chance to practice off platforms in Canada. He was overwhelmed, however, with the springboard win.
