THE TURKS' SIDE OF THE STORY.

The Turkish Legation at Washington has received the following official communication: "The Armenian agitators who made their appearance in the steep mountains of Talouze, situated between Asoon, in the southwest of Moush (Van) and the district of Galb, of the Moush district of Genoa, combined their forces at the instigation of a certain Hampranzou, who, under the assumed name of Moush, was already giving trouble in these regions. This Hampranzou, born in Haljny, after having for eight years studied medicine in the civil medical school at Constantinople, and participated in the disorders of Com-Capu, fled to Athens and then to Genoa. He afterwards went disguised, and again under an assumed name, by way of Alexandria, from Diarbakar to the neighborhood of Britis, and he began there his sedition agitation, together with five others."

Hampranzou was giving positive assurances to credulous people that he was a foreign agent, backed by all the European powers in his plan to upset the Turkish authorities. He succeeded thus in gaining the criminal confidence of the peasants of several villages, comprising four districts. Now these insurgents, under the command of Hampranzou, abandoning toward the latter part of the last year the houses and villages, and after having placed in accessible spots their wives, children and belongings, and secured the cooperation of other Armenian insurgents they came from the village of Moush, and when the case of Galb and Solvia, assembled together, numbering more than 3,000, at a place called Endok-Ghad. Six hundred of them decided to camp on Moush. They began by attacking the tribes close at hand, committing horrible crimes and depredations. 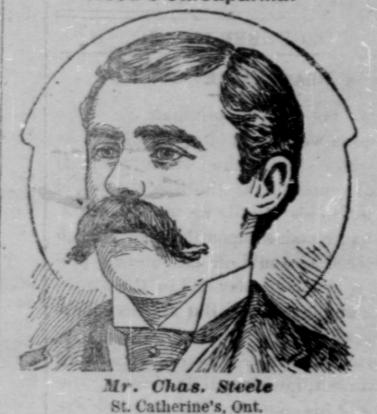
