THIRD TUESDAY IN JUNE.

Sir,—As the time now approaches for hiring and dismissing school teachers, a word about some of our school districts and the methods used in hiring and dismissing, and the dissatisfied and quarrelsome conditions of a good many localities, will not be out of place. I do not think I exaggerate when I say that there is no season in the year, even including Dominion and Local Elections that the usual serenity and peacefulness of the Island is wrought to a more dissatisfied state than on the eventful 3rd Tuesday in June. There are 470 school districts on the Island and there are nearly an equal number of dissatisfied districts after the annual meetings. There was a time when a teacher could be hired without fear for favoritism. But I am sorry to say such is not the case now; for friendly ties replace some of our oldest and ablest teachers by inferior teachers to the detriment of our educational standard. There are very few places now in which there are not two or three teachers belonging to the district, and each soliciting the support of the ratepayers. In many instances some of them are third class, who, not being able to get a school the first year, or who could not hold the one they had, sought relief from the ignorant P. E. in the "Land of the Free," but who now come back with the assurance of a full-fledged, pedagogical coccomb and lay siege to the ratepayers with the pitiable cry, "three months to keep my license in."

I do not think that their trips away have fitted them for the serious and laborious duties of a teacher. No doubt they have studied practical geography by travelling. But it would be better for the pupils and school districts if they did not continue their geographical course. There, there is another class who have friends in certain districts and who canvass the ratepayers to give their boy a chance. But the majority of the ratepayers may be satisfied with the teacher they have, who, by the way, may be an efficient teacher and giving good satisfaction; and the result is that on the eventful 3rd Tuesday in June the meeting ends, and in cases that I know of some few ratepayers come from it a little more or less disgraced; and if the new applicant is hired or the old one kept, very often a dissatisfied ratepayer either send his children to another school or keep them at home for six or eight months. In some instances the dispute is over the election of a trustee. One trustee may have a friend, and he knows that if a certain rate payer be elected trustee he will certainly co-operate in hiring this friend. But the worst phase of this is that the district is often canvassed and the rate payers bribed to vote for a certain trustee, and the bait that is sometimes given I am sorry to say is the whiskey bottle. This may be coming it strong. Yet I state but the facts, for such tactics are often used and it is painful to see that it is on the increase. If things continue as they are now the day is not far distant when the bribery cash will have to be administered on the day of the annual meeting or the Board of Education will have to take the hiring of the teacher in its own hands. Let the people at the coming annual meetings work together for the interests of their schools and support the teacher who has done good work; or if he or she, as the case may be, is only a time-server then stand as an unit to vote them out.

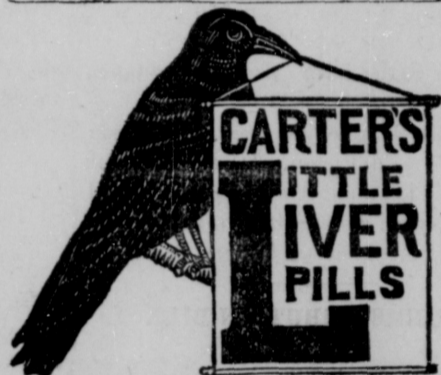
Mrs. Cotter, who has been spending the winter in Charleottetown returned home on Saturday.
