## Attending UNESCO Seminar At Athens

Visiting in Athens, Greece, at present is Miss Frances Johnston, director of the Art Centre here, who is attending as an observer the UNESCO seminar being conducted there. The seminar opened yesterday and Miss Johnston is the only one from Canada who made the special trip to Athens. She will stay at least two weeks for the major part of the seminar.

Miss Johnston spent several days in Rome after leaving Paris and was greatly taken with the Eternal City. On her first morning there she was awakened early by loud voices under her window. On looking out she saw where the entire little street was being transformed into a market with stalls set up and filled with baskets of "gorgeous looking fruits and vegetables." She said by 7:30 in the morning the street was a very busy place and she was told this went on every morning "so there is no need of an alarm clock."

She said the streets of Rome present fabulous vistas and she was constantly surprised as one architectural feature after another presented themselves as she walked around the streets. She wished that she had planned more time in Rome and less in Paris.

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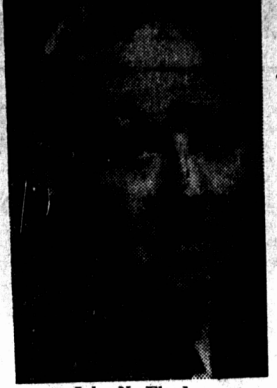

## Montague Town Council Monthly Meeting; Discuss New Fire Engine

The monthly meeting of the Montague Town Council was held last night with the Mayor, Bruce Yeo, the Town Clerk and three Council members present. The minutes of the previous meeting were adopted as read.

Under correspondence a letter from a lady in Portland, Me., was read, requesting that a street be named after her parents who were early settlers in Montague. It was decided that a letter be sent to her declaring that there were no streets available at this time but that the matter would be held for future consideration.

There was considerable discussion concerning the purchase of a pumper truck for the Town Fire Department. A motion was made and adopted, that the particular truck in question, be purchased for \$300.00 dollars and that Mr. Nicholson be given the power to buy the required parts to recondition it.

The police committee report it was disclosed that there was more difficulty involved in the bailing out of persons arrested in Montague than the Council had thought necessary. A committee, consisting of Mayor Yeo and Councillor MacGowan, was appointed to confer with Attorney General Darby and get a definite ruling concerning bail and the amount of time a prisoner must spend in jail after his bail has been posted.

The council discussed the opening of the new federal building, which will take place on Wednesday, Sept. 15th. It was decided to block off the street in front of the building and are looking after traffic problems before arrangements were made for seating arrangements at the ceremony.

## With Gene Autry Show



Cowboys and Indians go to gether like salt and pepper and hot dogs on a bun. That's why Gene Autry is bringing with him a group of authentic National Indian Dancers as part of his great two-hour show that will appear at the Charlottetown Forum on Wednesday, September 15, for two performances only, at 2:30 and 8 p.m.

Chief Tony Whitecloud and his group of real Indians have been away from their reservation and farms for just two appearances before the American public. The first time was with Gene in 1949 with the latter's World Championship Rodeo at Madison Square Garden in New York City, where they scored such a tremendous hit Gene had to bring them back again this past season by popular demand. In addition to this, they toured Europe with Gene last summer.

This group from the Jemez and Sandia tribes of the Pueblos in New Mexico are not too anxious to leave their homes for any length of time, but after a little persuasive talk by Gene, they agreed to accompany him on the present tour of one nighters to allow more audiences to see that the Indians are not vanishing entirely, and so show their real adeptness of the dances made famous by their forefathers in their ceremonial, warriors, pleasure and hunting dances of the painted deserts.

In addition to this tour, these

To go with the different style dances, there are different costumes which, by the way, are made entirely by hand by the Indians themselves. There is the Buffalo Dancer, portraying the greatest of game animals, grazing on the prairie, fighting or stampeding before the hunters. There is the Eagle Dancer, soaring among the clouds and sliding down the wind; the Horse-Tail Dancer, shying and prancing; stamping, whirling and whooping to the frenzy of the Tom-Toms is the War Dancer; and there is the Hoop Dancer, whipping his slim body through the willow hoops to the rhythm of the chanting and drums. Young and old alike should get a real thrill seeing this group.

In addition, of course, there will be Gene's two famous horses, Champion and Little Champ, and an all-star show headed by Pat Buttram, the Cass County Boys, Carl Cotner and his Melody Ranch Orchestra, the Strongs, Hubert Castle, and all the gang from Gene's Melody Ranch and many, many more.
