P. E. Island Hospital.

THE annual meeting of the contributors to the P. E. Island Hospital was held at the Hospital on Monday at 4 o'clock.

The Trustee's report refers with thankfulness to the fact that sufficient funds have been supplied through donations, church collections, &c., to enable them to sustain the institution in first-class order during the nine months of the year previous to the fire which took place on the first of March. The Insurance Company promptly paid the assessed damages, and the repairs are now nearly completed, and the building will be ready for patients in about ten days. The whole building is undergoing repairs, and sundry improvements have been made, thus rendering the institution much more convenient. The number of patients admitted during the nine months of the year was sixty-one, besides thirty-two out-door patients. There were forty-three operations performed. The Treasurer's account showed a balance on hand of \$608.59. That amount is exclusive of the sum received for insurance, the whole of which it is estimated will be expended on repairs and furniture.

The Hospital has been recognized by the Minister of Marine, and sick mariners will be cared for at the expense of the Dominion Government.

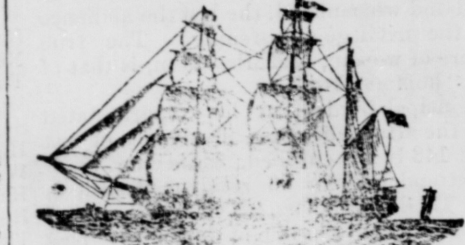
