## Beavers Outscore Halifax St. Mary's 3-1 In Finals Opener

SAINT JOHN, N. B., April 3—(CP)—Despite strong opposition Saint John Beavers showed enough know-how to outscore Halifax St. Mary's 3-1 tonight in the opening game of the Maritime Major Hockey League finals.

The second contest of the best-in-seven series will be played on the same ice Saturday night.

Dusty Blair, helped by Johnny Arundel, shot the only goal of the first period. The same combination, in reverse, made it 2-0 for Saint John in the second before Danny Nixon scored the single Halifax tally. Johnny Ubrico counted in the third. After a cautious opening session the play became fast and rugged. The Saints' lineup included newcomer Grant Warwick, former National Hockey League forward. He made a good showing.

Checking was close by both teams in the first period. The visitors, unable to get a shot away during the first 12 minutes, then did more attacking and gained an edge in the play but some of their shots, although handled by Hal Gordon, were headed outside the cage. In actual shots on goal, the teams were about even.

While two opposing players served a minor each at different times, neither side had a shot. Halifax lost a good scoring chance late in the period when Hughie Campbell caught Gordon out of position but he missed the open net.

### Sport Echoes From Prince County

Freetown Royals of the South Shore League have a tighter stranglehold on the Simmons and MacFarlane Trophy, emblematic of the South Shore League championship, than the Toronto Maple Leafs have on the Stanley Cup.

The Leafs give the mug up to another team occasionally (this year, for example), but Freetown wins the S and M mug all the time. They've won it seven years in a row now.

Mark Delaney, a Summerside boy, was the hero of the 1952 victory. After Cape Traverse had tied it up 2-all, Delaney scored the winning goal and snapped over a neat pass to Ray Smith for the insurance tally. At the start of the series Mark went on a scoring rampage, but the Cape boys seemed to have solved the threat of his quick dashes goalwards, and he had been pretty well muzzled for two games in a row. Perhaps the stalwart Cape defence began to think that this Delaney wasn't such a much after all and grew a bit careless.

### McArthur Injured

Boarding attempts by the Saints yielded no advantage but one of their centres, Joe McArthur, suffered a facial injury from a stick after less than five minutes of play and was out for the rest of the game.

The lone tally of this session followed a rush by Johnny Arundel to the Halifax blue line. The puck, dribbling loose, was taken by Blair. With no opposition between him and goalie Nipper O'Hearn, he took his time and aimed a soft shot. It went between Nipper's legs.

Play was more open, faster and rougher in the second period with Halifax holding a good edge. Nine minors were imposed, giving the Saints an advantage in manpower several times. Partly as a result of this, Gordon had to make twice as many stops as the Beavers.

With two Beavers and one Haligonian off, another Arundel rush made it 2-0. After some pokechecking by Blair, Johnny seized the puck and sailed through all the opposition. He let loose while still on the run and the rubber went home off O'Hearn's padding.

Both teams took a man short when Nixon shot in his own rebound as Halifax players swarmed around the cage.

Ubrico ended the scoring after 13 minutes of the last period. Matt Mesich, carrying the puck, lost and regained it before passing to Johnny, who shot from about 15 feet out.

The final session had plenty of huckelbacking and pokechecking. The goalies gave standout performances. Beavers appeared stronger than they were in the middle frame and play was fairly even during the last 20 minutes.

A hard check by Bob Drainville hurt Arundel, who left the ice with five minutes to go.

Meanwhile it is our view that these teams might just as fairly have been termed street teams, church teams or what have you. They definitely were not representative school teams.

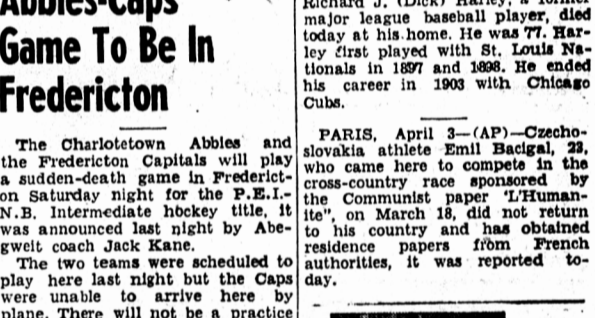
## Sport Briefs
