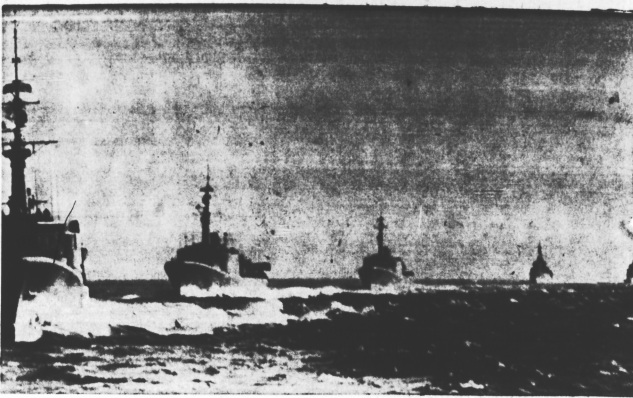

U.S. Cuts Cut In Research Vote

WASHINGTON (AP) — Defence Secretary Neil McElroy Monday wiped out a military spending cut of at least \$170,000,000 which included 60 million dollars in basic research funds, by misrepresentation, selecting McKelroy's predecessor, Charles E. Wilson.

McElroy said the basic research appropriation of \$1,700,000,000 authorized by Congress for the fiscal year which started

July 1, must not be touched in any economy drive.

Wilson on Aug. 17 ordered the navy, navy and air force to cut their spending by an amount equal to 10 per cent of the money for basic research. That is the largest range scientific program which frequently does not produce immediate useful results.

The secretary, according to defence department spokesmen, had intended that the money would not come out of the \$1,700,000,000 but out of the \$3,000,000,000 set aside for procurement and production in the research and development field.

At present the diet of high altitude pressure - suit pilots is limited to milk products and fruit and vegetable juices — all dispensed from cans through a tube by gravity.

LYE FOR WHITEWASH

The application of disinfectant whitewash is an effective means of disinfecting farm buildings and maintaining cleanliness.

The whitewash can be made as follows: Dissolve one pound of lye in 1/2 gallons of water, then add 2 1/2 pounds of water-slaked lime.

Whitewash is best applied with a sprayer, and the fluid should be strained through a fine screen to remove particles that might clog the nozzle.

The most effective sprayer is one that will generate enough air pressure to drive the disinfectant with considerable force. This will ensure that the fluid will penetrate cracks, corners and the rough parts of the surfaces.

The spray apparatus should be thoroughly flushed with clean water after use to avoid damage to leather or fabric parts.
