

## REVOLUTION IN MADRID.

### People Have Risen GENERAL CAMPOS ASSASSINATED

### Sagasta Fled to The British Consulate.

The Military are powerless. The Mob was maddened by the News of the Spanish defeat. Fall of the Regency expected.

PARIS, May 4—10 o'clock a. m.—A report has just reached here from Spain that there has been a rising of the populace and very serious rioting in the streets of Madrid.

It is reported in the despatch that Marshal Campos was assassinated by the mob and that the Spanish Premier, Senor Sagasta was forced to take refuge from the fury by seeking shelter in the British Embassy.

The state of affairs is very serious the populace having evidently risen en masse. Thrice the authorities have broken up large crowds of rioters who were marching through the streets of Madrid shouting "Down with the Bourbons," "Long live Don Carlos and Weyler," "Vive La Republic."

A strict censorship was put over all the telegraph lines early last evening, and the only news obtainable is that which comes from the frontier.

The report of the assassination of Mar-

shal Campos is credited here as it comes from several sources.

A further despatch gives the information that Madrid was completely in the hands of a raging mob last night, and that the people had gone mad over the defeat of the Spanish fleet by the Americans at Manila.

NEW YORK, May 4.—The New York Herald this morning has received a special cable message from Gibraltar, to the effect that Marshal Campos and Moret had been murdered last night in the streets of Madrid by an insurrectionary mob, and that Senor Sagasta is a fugitive.

LONDON, May 4.—A cable message from Brussels received here this morning announces that Spain is in the throes of a revolution and that the end of the Regency is in sight.

The Carlists, it adds, have risen in Madrid, and have looted the stores of guns and ammunition, and the military in the city are powerless.

## TO ANNIHILATE SPAIN'S SHIPS

### When They Come Over

AND THEN BOMBARD HAVANA AND PORTO RICO.

Americans Will Prevent Spanish Ships From Coaling.

WASHINGTON, May 4.—The Government are now planning the complete annihilation of the Spanish fleet which has sailed from Cape Verde, and when this is done, Havana and Porto Rico will be bombarded, and troops landed on both islands.

The strategic plan is now to head off Spain's Atlantic fleet should it make for Nova Scotia to coal, which is believed to be probable, and drive it into Porto Rico, where, hemmed in, Admiral Sampson will wipe it out of existence.

Scout cruisers have been sent out all along the coast.

The Minneapolis, New Orleans, San Francisco, and Columbia have been ordered to cruise 200 to 600 miles off New England and Nova Scotia coast and watch for the enemy.

Commodore Schelys squadron is ordered to cruise off New York and Admiral Sampson's fleet is to lay for Spaniards off Cuba.

### MEDIATION IS IMPROBABLE.

VIENNA, May 4.—No agreement has been arrived at between the Powers for mediation at any future time.

The disparity of the views is such as makes the co-operation of all the six powers in any diplomatic step highly improbable.

### Cuban Parliament.

TORONTO, May 3.—Senor Polo, late Spanish ambassador to United States, has received a message from Captain-General Blanco, at Havana, stating the Cuban elections had resulted in the return of 51 autonomists and 14 conservatives. The election began April 27. Autonomists supporters of Premier Sagasta's new scheme of constitutional liberty for Cuba. The conservatives are those who are supporters of the old Spanish method of rule. The Cuban parliament will meet May 4th.

## U. S. TROOPS WILL NOT LAND

### On Cuban Soil To-day.

THE GOVERNMENT HAS DELAYED THEIR DEPARTURE.

A Cautious Policy Will be Followed for a Few Days.

TAMPA, Florida, May 4. — General Shafter's force will not leave here today, the date originally set for the departure of the first American expedition to Cuban soil.

The delay is due to the administration pursuing a cautious policy.

The military authorities here do not believe Havana will be bombarded unless the forts draw the fire of the blockading squadron, as they know the Washington authorities are opposed to any chances being taken until the Spanish fleet has been disposed of.

### BIG FIRE AT TRURO.

### Bound to Fight it out.

LONDON, May 3.—The Spanish Cabinet according to a special despatch from Madrid to the Evening News, sat for four hours and only discussed the Manila disaster. The discussion it is added, showed that the Spanish ministers "are now fully aroused and determined to exhaust their resources in defence of the national honor."

### A Desperate Defence

LONDON, May 3.—The Havana correspondent of the Daily Mail, says Captain General Blanco has determined upon a desperate defence of Havana. In Matanzas 10,000 soldiers are engaged day and night in throwing up earthworks.

### Defeat with Honour.

MADRID, May.—The newspapers of this city, commenting upon the utter defeat of the Spanish fleet at the battle of Manila agree in saying that yesterday was a "sad but glorious day for Spain." They urge the people to be calm, and to allow nothing to shake their confidence in future triumphs of the Spanish arms.

### The Tonnage Tax.

WASHINGTON, May 3.—The senate committee on finance practically decided today to eliminate the tonnage tax feature of the war revenue bill to avoid criticism of European countries.
