

ENGLISH MAIL.

The English Mail was received here on Wednesday morning. The latest dates are Liverpool 6th and Queenstown 7th inst. The most important news has been anticipated by Telegraph. We learn that the Loan Bill passed at the last session of the Legislature of this Island, has received the Royal assent. In the great regatta which took place at St. Cloud on the Seine, the Western Club from St. John, N. B., won two international prizes. So much for the New Dominion to feel proud of. We publish in another column a summary of the latest news.

The Examination of the Prince of Wales College and Grammar School took place on the 12th and 13th instants. His Honor the Chief Justice presided. The examination, we learn, was a searching one, and the proficiency acquired by the scholars and the manner in which they acquitted themselves, reflect credit on them and the Professors in charge of the Institution. Several prizes were awarded to the most deserving boys.

THE GRAND ORANGE TEA AND DEMONSTRATION.

This event came off in Charlottetown on Friday last, the 12th July. The Patriot says: "From all sections of Queen's County, and from Prince and King's as well as waggon loads of Orangemen, their wives, sisters or sweethearts might be seen early in the morning driving toward. About one o'clock a procession was formed in the Crickes Club field, and from thence, led by the Volunteer Band at its head, marched into the City through Kent Street, down Pownall Street, across to and up Queen Street to Stamper's Corner, and thence along Richmond Street and back to the place of starting. The procession, which included members of the Legislature, Justices of the Peace and Officers of Militia, numbered over 900 persons, nearly all of whom wore Orange sashes or other appropriate badges. The Provincial Grand Lodge, formed two deep, led the way, and the subordinate Lodges with music and banners came next. On the grounds where tea was served, all was good order and sobriety. The people came together for a day's pleasure and recreation, and they studiously kept that object in view. Several Roman Catholics were also present, and they seemed to enjoy themselves like the rest. There was not the slightest manifestation of unfriendly feeling towards them. On the contrary, we believe but little time was lost for speechifying, and consequently the addresses were very brief. The principal speakers were J. B. Cooper, Esq., Provincial Grand Master; Rev. Mr. Chapple, B. C. M., who said he was not an Orangeman; Rev. D. FitzGerald, for thirty-five years a member of the L. O. Institution; County Master Wood of New Brunswick; and the Hon. Kenneth Henderson. About 2000 persons sat down to tea. Temperance beverages were also supplied, and in abundance. The arrangements reflect great credit on the managing committee who spared neither labor nor expense in making provision for the accommodation of those who patronized the Demonstration. The day though cloudy was fine. At an early hour in the evening, and in a quiet and orderly manner, the friends from the country started for their respective homes, which we hope they reached in safety.

WESLEYAN BAZAAR.—The Wesleyan Bazaar closed last evening. It was open three days, and was one of the most successful affairs ever held in Charlottetown. It realized the handsome sum of about £475, which is to be expended in the erection of a new Mission House on the site of the old Wesleyan Chapel.—Lat.

LONDON, July 13. An agreement has been arrived at in the House of Commons whereby the Reform Bill will be passed to a third reading on Monday next.

VIENNA, July 13. The Imperial Government has despatched Admiral Tegethoff to Mexico for the body of Maximilian. The Admiral goes by way of New York.

Paris, July 14. The corner stone of the new Protestant Church for the accommodation of American residents and visitors in this capital was laid yesterday in the presence of a large concourse of people. At the conclusion of the ceremony the United States Consul at Paris, John G. Nicolay, Esq., gave a dinner, at which all the principal American citizens now here and several eminent friends of the United States, were present. In the evening there was a tasteful display of fireworks in honor of the occasion.

Paris, July 15. In the great regatta which took place at St. Cloud on the Seine during the past week and closed on Saturday, the Western Club from St. John, N. B., rowing a four-oared boat won two of the international prizes. They had to compete with three Oxford and two London boats of the same class.

Dublin, July 15. Reports from the County of Mayo and the adjoining district of Conemaun, represent that the destitution and suffering of the inhabitants are becoming extreme in consequence of the famine in that part of the island.

LONDON, July 15. A prominent Fenian, supposed to be Gen. Farrell, was arrested in this city last night, and has been sent to Dublin for trial. A man named Selveria, claiming to be a citizen of the United States, was recently arrested in Paris at the request of the Portuguese government, and sent to Lisbon.

The American Minister at that place has made a demand upon the Government of Portugal for the release of the prisoner and for his return to Feance in a Portuguese man-of-war.

LONDON, July 15. The Russian Government has sold the St. Petersburg and Moscow Railroad to Messrs. Bearing Brothers and Hontingour.

Paris, July 15, eve. The trial of Bergoussi for his attempt to assassinate the Czar of Russia, has resulted in a verdict of guilty, with extenuating circumstances, and he has been sentenced to imprisonment at hard labor for life.

In the course of debate in the Corps Legislatif to-day, Minister Rouher declared that France was indifferent to the question of German Unity.

Berlin, July 15, eve. The Prussian Government is taking steps for the formation of a fleet in the Baltic.

LONDON, July 15, midnight. In the House of Commons to-night, the Reform bill was passed to a third reading. The Government denies that any troops have been ordered to Abyssinia for the rescue of the English captives, but asks authority to use the Sepoys for an expedition.
