MAY BE A WIFE MURDERER.—A. W. Hamilton, of South Boston, was arrested on the 14th, and is held to await the result of an autopsy on the body of his wife, who was found dead early that morning under suspicious circumstances.

IMMIGRATION RETURNS.—The Ontario Immigration Report shows that during the year 1889 there settled in the provinces 15,287 persons—from England, 9,023; from Scotland, 2,347; from Ireland, 2,208; from Germany, 779; and from other countries, 955.

ENTERTAINMENT.—An entertainment and picnic will be held at Pownall Hall, on Tuesday evening, 25th inst., in aid of the "Bleeding Hope" Lodge at Alexandra. The Alexandra choir will be in attendance, and a good time is expected.

THANKS.—Mr. John McQuaid tenders his sincere thanks to the gentlemen of South Shore who so kindly assisted him in saving his wife and family, and the attack of Mr. T. A. McLean, of Holland Cove farm, from fire on the night of the 13th, which farm Mr. McQuaid had in charge this last five years.

AT IT AGAIN.—William Delaney, of St. John, while in a fit of temporary insanity, attempted to commit suicide Sunday morning by jumping out of a three story window. He was caught just as he was leaping. Delaney made a similar attempt a couple of months ago, and received very severe injuries from which he recovered.

POLICE COURT.—Two cases of allowing horses to go at large, and a case of cruelty to animals made up the docket this morning. One of the first mentioned cases was dismissed and the other was disposed of by the Magistrate ordering the defendant to pay all the expenses incurred by the city in keeping the horse. The cruelty to animals case was adjourned.

BEARS CAPTURED.—On Wednesday the 5th inst., a young man named Roderick F. McIsaac discovered in the woods at Rock Barra a bear with two cubs. Shortly after the mother bear was shot by Mr. James Donovan and Capt. Barnaby McIsaac, of Bayfield. The cubs were captured by Messrs. Joseph and Ronald McIsaac, and sold alive to parties at Souris.

ST. JOSEPH'S DAY.—This being St. Joseph's Day, the usual celebration took place at St. Joseph's Convent, where Masses were said by Rev. Fathers McLean and McIntyre, and over 250 Sodality girls approached the altar. A solemn Benediction will be given this evening in the Convent chapel, where the Cathedral clergy and Fathers Burke and McIntyre will be present. Father McLean preaches the sermon.

A SINGULAR ACCIDENT.—A little fellow named David Alexander Rozlad, living at 17 Anderson street, Montreal, was passing by a butcher's stall in that neighbourhood the other afternoon, when one of the men who chopping some meat missed his mark and the axe glanced off the block and hit the boy a severe blow between the eyes. He bled profusely, but on the ambulance arriving he was attended to by Dr. Potts, and removed to the General Hospital, where the wound was dressed.

WIGGINS AGAIN.—An Ottawa despatch says that Prof. Wiggins has been interviewed regarding his letter to the marine department in which he stated that "a storm of unusual severity will occur on the coast of Europe on the 17th to 19th instant, and on the American coast on the 21st to 23rd instant." "Nothing short of a miracle," he said, "will prevent the destruction of shipping that may be caught out of harbor, especially the coasting fleet in the Gulf of St. Lawrence and the Bay of Fundy. Subsequent volcanic eruptions and earthquakes in the northern Pacific and probably in Europe will sufficiently demonstrate the planetary origin of the storm."

TELEGRAPHIC NEWS.

SPECIAL DESPATCHES TO THE EXAMINER.

DOMINION PARLIAMENT

Summary of Proceedings.

OTTAWA, March 18.

In the House of Commons to-day, when a motion was made to go into supply, Mr. Auyot moved an amendment, declaring that the Provincial Legislatures alone had the right to appoint Queen Counsel, suphis motion with a long speech.
Sir John Thompson denied that Her Majesty formed any part of the Legislature of a Province, and cited the judgment of the Supreme Court in Lenoir vs. Ritchie in support of his contention.
After speeches by Mills and Mulock, the motion was withdrawn.

Sir Richard Cartwright inquired if the budget would be submitted on Friday.
Hon. Mr. Foster replied that it would not, but would be delivered the first day available thereafter. Tuesday being a holiday, this will bring the budget on Thursday of next week, unless Wednesday is given as a government day.

The House then went into committee of supply, passing geological surveys and Indian department appropriations until adjournment at 1 1/2 a. m.

In the Senate, Hon. Mr. McInnis' bill to make Gaelic an official language was defeated by 42 to 7.

The privileges and elections committee will meet to-morrow to commence the investigation into the Rykert case.

The Modus Vivendi Condemned

ST. JOHN'S, Nfld., March 18.

Great alarm and indignation have been created here over the "modus vivendi" negotiated with the French in regard to the lobster fishery on the shores of Newfoundland. The claim to the right to catch and pack lobsters on the coast and shore of the Island is not admitted by our people. Its recognition, as understood here, is regarded as a fresh infringement on the Colony's rights and territory. Both Chambers of the Legislature have passed resolutions strongly condemning the modus vivendi as an invasion of the Colony's territorial rights and injurious to our fisheries and our people who depended upon them. These have been telegraphed to London to-day. Public feeling here is very strong over the affair.

Bismarck's Resignation.

BERLIN, March 18.

It is just announced that Prince Bismarck's resignation of the Chancellorship was accepted by the Emperor at noon to-day. All members of the Prussian Ministry resigned at the same time as Bismarck tendered his resignation. It is reported that all the members of the Imperial Ministry have resigned.

BERLIN, March 18.

It is authoritatively stated that the difference between the Emperor and Bismarck arises from the latter's refusal to accede to the request made by Dr. Winthorst, the leader of the clerical party, to restore to the Duke of Cumberland "the claimant of the throne of Hanover," the larger portion of the Guelph funds.

The Government Defeated.

LONDON, March 18.

The Government were defeated in the House of Commons on the motion of Buchanan (Liberal) complaining of encroachment upon public right of way in Scotland, asking that the laws be reformed, and that the matter be entrusted to the County Councils. The motion was adopted.

Charged With Embezzlement.

MONTREAL, March 18.

Alex. Shaw, Secretary and Treasurer of the Canada Life Co., was arrested to-day charged with embezzling \$10,000 of the company's funds. The fraud covers several years. Experts are still examining the books for other frauds. Shaw is an officer in the Victoria Rifles.

An Important Caucus.

LONDON, March 18.

Lord Salisbury has summoned all the supporters of the Government in the Commons to meet at the Carlton Club house on Thursday, when matters of importance will be submitted for their consideration.
