GOVERNOR DEWDNEY, of the Northwest Territory, accompanied by Lieut-Col. McLeod Hayter, Reid and others, held a council with the Blackfoot Indians under Crowfoot half way between Medicine Hat and Calgary. They have succeeded in inducing them to accept the new reserve and treaty. Rev. Pere Lacombe was of great service during the negotiations.

MR. THOMAS CRANE, of China Point, desirous of making a test of the butter-making qualities of Jersey cows, kept one separately from his other cattle for fourteen days. The result was that the milk gathered during these days yielded 20 lbs. of butter. Mr. Crane thinks this a very good yield, more especially as the animal was placed on but indifferent pasture.

PERSONAL.—The Hon. Sir Charles Tupper, K. C. M. G., C. B., High Commissioner for the Dominion of Canada, accompanied by Lady Tupper and Mr. Charles H. Tupper, M. P., arrived in Liverpool yesterday by the Allan royal mail steamer "Campanian" from Halifax, and are staying at Eberly's Grand Hotel. They proceeded to London to-day (Thursday).—Liverpool (G. B.) Journal of Commerce, June 28th.

AQUATIC.—The Halifax oarsmen, Hamm and Conley, accompanied by their trainer, William Spielman, arrived home on Saturday evening, and went to their quarters near the Four Mill House. Hamm, when he boarded the train at St. John, got permission from the station agent there to suspend his boat in the first-class car, where it was made the subject of considerable criticism, especially by the ladies, as regards its diminutive and fragile appearance.

A SUGGESTION.—Could not a change be effected in the Railway Time Table, which would enable passengers per Steam Navigation Boats from Pictou to Georgetown to reach this city the same evening. As the case now stands, a steamer leaves Pictou every Thursday at 2 p. m., and arrives at Georgetown about 5 p. m. The Georgetown train leaves for this city at 3 p. m.; consequently passengers are obliged to remain there all night. Were a change effected it would be a great convenience to the travelling public.

THE coffee-houses erected as a philanthropic experiment in Boston have proved a complete success. They have been open in operation for sixteen months, yet a profit of \$1,000 a month has been reached. The capital was furnished by benevolent men; but plate-glass windows, hard-wood finish, decorated walls, and tasteful furnishings, remove the impression of cheap charity. Not only are good meals furnished at a low rate, but there are reading rooms, smoking parlors, and billiard rooms, the idea being to furnish all the social attractions of the saloons, with the exception of intoxicating drinks.

TELEGRAPHIC NEWS.

[SPECIAL DESPATCHES TO THE EXAMINER.]

French Daring.

LONDON, July 12.

Gladstone announced in the House of Commons, yesterday, that the French Troops had proclaimed siege against Tamatave, in Madagascar, had hauled down the British flag on the Consulate's building, and planted there the French ensign. That they had ordered the English Consul, who was lying sick in bed, to leave Tamatave within twenty-four hours, and had arrested the Secretary of the Consulate and a Missionary who refused giving explanations regarding the Consulate. Mr. Gladstone said that the Home Government was anxiously awaiting explanations from the French authorities concerning this outrageous breach of amity.

The New Suez Canal.

LONDON, July 12.

The British Government and Count De Lesseps have come to an arrangement providing for the immediate construction of the new Suez Canal.

Telegraph Notes.

A private telegram from Alexandria says that 57 deaths from cholera occurred on Monday at Damietta.

According to advices from Behera, the cattle plague has ended with the death of all the cattle in that district.

The feeling at Berlin against the Vatican is so strong that the possibility of a rupture of the relations is being considered.

The coal mine troubles are all settled at the different mines with the exception of the Hurst mines and Butler mines. The bases of settlement are three cents per bushel.

Sir Charles Dilke stated in the British House of Commons on Monday, that it was not the intention of the Government to quarantine vessels coming to England from India or Egypt.

At Damietta, on Tuesday, 49 deaths occurred from cholera, and at Mansurah 101 deaths were reported. At the latter place a number of Greeks forced the cordons surrounding the city and escaped.

M. Akard has introduced a bill in the French Chamber of Deputies authorizing the taking of soundings for piers for a railway bridge across Cape Grisnux on the French coast from Cape Strait of Dover to Folkestone in England.

An agreement has been arrived at between De Lesseps and the Government of Great Britain, which provides for a new Suez Canal parallel to the one now in existence; for the reduction of canal dues; and for the appointment of an English surveyor of traffic.

The report of the committee of the House of Lords, which has had the Irish land act under consideration, has been submitted to the House. The committee find that the immigration clauses of the act have failed; that the modes of valuation of the land are unreliable; that the relations between landlords and tenants have not improved, and that tenants have become demoralized and maintain the hope that a fresh agitation will bring about the passage of a new act.

In the contest at Wimbledon, on the 11th, for the Halford prize, at 1,000 yards, Dr. Scott, of the American team, scored 44 out of a possible 50. The contest for the Molinex prize, at 1,000 yards, Major Shakespeare, of the American team, tied the top scores, making 33 out of a possible 35. In the second round, at 800 yards, Bull and Brown scored 30 each. Lieut. Scott, 24, Joiner 27, Van-Heusen 29, Stewart, 36, Paulding, 38, Hinman 32, Cosh 25, Pollard 24, D. Scott 29, Smith 25, Rabbeth 25, Dolan 25, Col. Howard 28, and Alder 23. Major Shakespeare made a total of 60 in the two rounds.

In the French Chamber of Deputies, on the 10th inst., M. Challemlac Lacour, Minister of Foreign Affairs, said that the French force in Tonquin was sufficient for any opposition it was likely to encounter. He continued: "It is now evident that Tudec is France's enemy. There is no longer any question of negotiation with him. France must now resort to fighting. M. Harmond, French Civil Commissioner in Harmond, will commence treating as soon as possible after the opposition to France has subsided. France will occupy only the Tonquin Delta. She has no intention of conquering Annam. The reports of Chinese aggression are unfounded. I am able to state that pacific relations will be maintained with China. Paul De Cassagnac made a violent attack upon the Government. He called Prime Minister Ferry the worst of cowards and a liar. He was censured for his language and ordered to be excluded from the House for a fortnight. An order of the day expressing confidence in the firm and present policy of the Government was adopted by 371 to 82.

FOR THE NORTH.—The Hon. Peter Mitchell, M. P., for Northumberland, left St. John last evening for Newcastle, after spending the principal part of the day in the city. Travelling in company with him were the Hon. John R. Thomas, member of Congress for Illinois, and Col. J. H. Baxter, M. D., Chief Medical Purveyor of the United States Army. Mr. Thomas entered the army while quite a youth, fought through the civil war, and was several times wounded, but not seriously, and rose to the rank of major. His descent is from distinguished families in Great Britain and Ireland. He is a relative of Patrick Henry. Dr. Baxter has almost reached the top of his profession. He will soon be Surgeon-General. Both gentlemen, as well as the ex-Minister of Marine and Fisheries, are distinguished disciples of Izaak Walton. They intend to try their luck in our Northern rivers. This is their first visit to this Province.—St. John Telegraph.
