DOMINION PARLIAMENT.

The Bank Act.

OTTAWA, March 21. Sir Leonard Tilley's bill relating to Banks and Banking, and the several acts amending the same, passed the second reading yesterday.

Sir A. T. Galt.

Sir John McDonald, in the House of Commons yesterday, announced that Sir Alexander T. Galt, Canadian High Commissioner to England, had tendered his resignation.

Winter Communication.

Captain Arthur Irving, of Cape Traverse, gave evidence before the special committee which is enquiring into the best means of communication between Prince Edward Island and the mainland. He testified that trade was increasing in this Province; that more boats were wanted, and that for the couriers and their boats should be created at Cape Traverse and Cape Tormentine.

King's County Election Case.

The Committee on Privileges and Elections are still considering the King's County Election case. Dr. Robertson appeared before the Committee yesterday. He testified that, on the 12th of June, 1882, he tendered his resignation as a member of the Provincial Legislature to Malcolm McTavish and Dr. McLaren.

Threatening the New Archbishop.

LONDON, March 21. The Dean of Westminster has received a letter threatening to blow up the Deanery when the new Archbishop is enthroned.

Telegraph Notes.

Bishop Littlejohn laid the corner stone of a new American church, at Dresden, on the 18th. A large concourse was present at the ceremony.

The whole country on the border of the frontier is in a state of anarchy. Natives are arming against the Boers. Chief Mopoh has just defeated the Boers, inflicting severe loss.

Sheepmen in Texas report a heavy loss from the cold rains last week. The largest losses say they have lost a third of their flocks and that there will be a total loss of the lamb crop. The loss west of the Neuse river will reach \$250,000.

A wrestling match for \$1,000, between Donnan C. Ross and Prof. Theo. Bauer, Roman style, best 2 in 3, occurred at St. Charles Theatre at New Orleans, last night on the first and third rounds. The match lasted one hour and forty-nine minutes.

It is probable that the informer Carey will be brought very close to the gallows after all. It is stated that evidence has been secured sufficient to convict him of the murder some years ago of a fellow-workman, whom he threw into a drain and hid there until he was choked to death.

A London despatch says: It is expected that emigration to Canada during the ensuing week will be unusually extensive. The steamer Parisian, which sailed from Liverpool to Halifax, on the 18th took 450 emigrants. A large number of Scandinavians and Germans will proceed to North-west Canada in the course of the next five weeks.

Mrs. Carleton, 20 years old, a resident of Watertown, eight miles from Boston, was brutally murdered in her own doorway, on the 18th, a rock crushing in the skull by an unknown man. There has been trouble between herself and husband. The latter has not been home for ten days. Up to 11 P.M. p. m., on the 18th the search for him had been unsuccessful. Mrs. Carleton had two children.

The anniversary of the Paris Commune of 1871 was celebrated by Communists in New York on the 18th inst., in Concordia Hall. There was a large assemblage, each person wearing a ribbon of red. Herr John Most, in the course of his address, said the Paris Commune was "too humane and the Commune of the future will be established regardless of humanity and with a firm hand to wield the sword of destruction."

According to the deposition of Owen, of St. Louis, the defaulting teller of the Third National Bank it appears he abstracted from that institution about \$209,000 since 1878, when he began his thieving operations, up to the time of his arrest. This money was all sunk in butter and cheese and in speculations in cotton and grain. He is to be sentenced to-morrow, when it is expected he will get between five and ten years in the penitentiary.

There was an interesting ceremony on Friday at Albert Hall, London, the distribution of prizes by the Princess of Wales to 100 girls, who are pupils of the public day schools company, an enterprise launched two years ago under the patronage of the Princess Louise, and presenting the singular spectacle of a commercial company, successfully conducting the education of 5,000 girls, paying five per cent. dividend and giving perhaps the best middle class education to be had in England. Lord Lansdowne and Lady Stanley, of Althorpe, who arranged the admirably organized ceremony, and many other distinguished persons took part. The Princess of Wales spoke with his usual good sense. There were 3,000 pupils present and 10,000 spectators.

The steamship City of Peking has arrived at San Francisco from China and Japan bringing the following news, of Feb. 20th. A French transport with the first installment of troops for the Tsinquin expedition is reported to have arrived at her destination. It is currently reported in Shanghai that the British authorities propose to initiate the example lately introduced by a German official and resort to forcible measures if private business is obstructed by the Chinese. The British telegraph company desires to land a new cable at Shanghai, but has acknowledged a doubt of the right to do so, and has asked permission from the Chinese Government, who have

withheld their answer for several weeks. Representations having been made to the British foreign office, it is said to have telegraphed instructions to land forcibly, if necessary.

Patrick Egan, in conversation at Waterbury, U. S., said he had come to America to prevent the extradition of P. J. Sheridan as he could give evidence proving that Sheridan was not in Ireland at the time of the Phoenix Park murders. At the close of a lecture on St. Patrick, by Father Lilly, of Ohio, which was listened to by a large audience, Father Walsh introduced Egan as "the little man who made the British lion tremble." Egan said Ireland is to-day in the hands of a most brutal and coercive foe, who is hanging innocent men, bayonetting women, and shooting down children. England, he said, with her spies, infamous and packed juries, is trying to crush out the national life of Ireland, but there is a new Ireland this side of the Atlantic which she cannot trample out, and which will hold her to a reckoning for the crimes committed at home. Egan was received with prolonged applause. Father Walsh said that Egan was not ashamed nor afraid at the proper time to give a full account of the Land League funds.

Lady Florence Dixie was attacked at Windsor, on the 17th, by two men, disguised in women's clothes. Her dress was cut with daggers in several places, but she received no injury. Lady Florence was walking in a secluded spot near the woods when two men asked her what time it was. She replied that she had no watch and afterwards noticed that though they wore women's clothes their faces had been shaved. Much alarmed, she started to walk away followed by the men, one of whom seized her. She struggled to escape but seeing daggers, she fell in a swoon. This took place at four in the afternoon, and she did not recover her senses until 4.45 p. m. on the 18th. Lady Florence had been prostrated on the 18th. The story of the affair was elicited from her only at intervals. The saving of her life is attributed to her St. Bernard dog which, it is supposed, protected her while she lay in a swoon. Lady Florence had no reason to suspect immediate danger although she has been somewhat fearful since the receipt of letters about the Land League. The last thing she remembers is one of the men pushing a quantity of mud into her mouth. On her recovery she found that both palms were cut across and the gloves severed. There were two dagger holes, two inches apart, in the right breast of her dress. A broad steel corset rib had been broken by the weapon which had penetrated to the inner lining of her dress at the first stroke and to her corset at the second stroke. Lady Florence supposed she unconsciously struggled with the men, assisted with her dog, until the scoundrels were disturbed by a cart passing the woods. She received threatening letters while in Ireland recently. One of the men wore a green dress and a large hat with a veil. The veiled man attempted assassination. No arrests have been made. The police have a slight clue to the scoundrels. It is believed that the men were bitten in the struggle.
