Correcting Children.

To correct children for trifling offences continually, at home or in school, has a bad effect. It is confusing to the child, and does not tend to develop or to cultivate the moral sense. Fearful Outrages.

A despatch of the 26th inst. from Auckland, New Zealand, states that the Government schooner Julia, which is regularly employed in procuring laborers from different groups of islands in the Pacific, to work on sugar plantations in the Sandwich Islands, recently landed at the Island of Nanouki, with about thirty returned laborers who belonged to the Islands of Faraway and Opiang in the same group, inhabitants of which have been at constant warfare with the inhabitants of Nanouki. The returned laborers on landing, seized a number of young girls and ravished them, which provoked a fight with the natives who were armed only with clubs and spears. Twenty of the Nanoukis were killed and many wounded, while others escaped to the Island of Apamama a short distance away. Being reinforced there, a number returned to Nanouki, where another affray occurred in which several were killed on each side, and three or four of the assailants were carried off to Apamama.
