

S' side Council Monthly Meeting

A resolution declaring Monday, December 27, and Monday, January 3, civic holidays in the Town of Summerside was passed at the regular meeting of the Town Council held in the chambers last evening. His Worship Mayor Henry W. Wedge presiding.

Councillor Steele reported that work on the library was started three weeks ago and although there had been some delay in getting a window, it has now been installed and the painters are ready to start work immediately in improving the looks of the building.

Councillor MacDougall, chairman of the police and fire committee read the recently revised by-laws of the Summerside Fire Department which were approved. He also suggested the hiring of a part-time employee to take care of the fire fighting equipment.

Councillor Clark suggested that two firemen, who are familiar with the working of the pumper, be employed to reside at the fire station permanently. This would result in faster service, he said, as the pumper could be at the scene of the fire almost immediately. It was decided to look into this matter and make preparations for the winter months.

Councillor MacDougall expressed regret that since the death of time Judge L. G. Lewis Summerside has been without a juvenile court judge and he suggested that the Town Clerk write the Premier concerning this matter and authority was given for this to be done.

In reply to a query from Councillor Clark on complaints from residents on Upper Grayville Street concerning street lights being out of order, Councillor Jenkins said in one case a fuse in a transformer was at fault and also that the storms have loosened the connections, allowing moisture to get in resulting in power failures. He stated that the light company is doing everything possible to provide satisfactory service.

Councillor Perry stated that the cause for water backing up in the storm sewer at the High School had been located. He also said in his report that 100 loads of material had been removed from Noonan Street in preparation for paving next year and that it had been used as fill, 10 loads going to Jenkins Brothers and the rest to the Dehydration Plant, Amalgamated Dairies, the Abattoir and on Calhoun Street, Councillor Jenkins pointed out that a good percentage of this material was comprised of ashes and clam, oyster and quahog shells which had been spread on Noonan Street as fill over the past several years.

In reply to a question by Councillor Clark as to when the Maritime Electric Power lines are to be hooked up with the Summerside system, Mayor Wedge said that the poles are up and that possibly this would take place in January. Correspondence read included an application for a position with the Summerside Fire Department.

Plan To Ban Sale Of Raw Milk In Town Of Alberton

—Mayor H. E. Barbour presided and Councillors Matthews, Burke, Nicholson, Atkinson, and Profit were in attendance at the regular meeting of Alberton Town Council last night. Minutes were read by the Town Clerk, Henry Clarke, and bills approved.

Following discussion it was approved that the by-law prohibiting the sale of non-pasteurized milk in the town be put into effect immediately, and a further motion to the effect that all milk vendors in the town procure a license was endorsed by the council. The issuance of licenses at a set fee will be controlled by the council.

It was decided to declare Mon-

day, Dec. 27th and Monday, Jan. 3rd, 1955, civic holidays in the town.

Mr. C. R. Profit, Justice of the Peace, was appointed magistrate.

The purchase of additional fire fighting equipment was discussed at some length. Councillor Burke stated that a demonstration of a new type of pumper was scheduled for this Thursday and also that it would be necessary to purchase a new fire hose.

The sum of \$500.00 was placed in the sinking fund.

The town policeman was appointed caretaker of fire fighting equipment, replacing Erskine Gavin who is presently employed in Summerside.

75 Pigs Lost In S' side West Fire

—A disastrous fire occurred last evening at 3:30 p.m. at Summerside, West, when the pigery owned by Mr. Clovis Perry, housing about 103 pigs was completely destroyed along with 75 of the pigs.

Origin of the fire is uncertain but it is believed that it might have been caused by a spark from the stove used to heat the feed

boiler. Stored in the pigery was an estimated 5 tons of straw which was also lost and which fed the flames making it impossible to do anything to control the fire.

No estimate of the loss could be learned last evening and since there was practically no insurance on the building or its contents the loss to Mr. Perry is a heavy one.

Of the number of pigs which were saved from the fire a number were badly burned before they could be released and possibly some of these will have to be destroyed adding further to the loss.

However, it was generally agreed at the meeting that something tangible should be done by the club and that whatever funds will be raised through the dance to be held on Wednesday night at the Diner, along with other donations which have been received or provided, should be used in sponsoring what will be known as the Lion's Milk Fund.—S

Officers of the Prince Edward Island Oyster Growers Association were elected at a re-organization meeting held in the Summerside Town Hall on Friday evening and are as follows: President, Lorne Beaton St. Eleanor; vice president, Brenton Clark, Summerside; secretary, T. H. E. Inman, Summerside; Burton Burleigh, Ellerslie; James G. MacLean, Grand River.

The meeting passed a resolution requesting the Fisheries department to reduce the legal size limit from 3 1/2 inches to 3 inches.

Among the reasons given for asking for this reduction in size is the mortality rate, which means that a certain percentage of oysters die each year before reaching the legal size and that some stunted oysters never reach that size.—S
