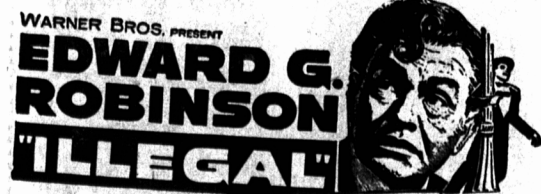
Dedication Service Held in Murray Harbour Church
