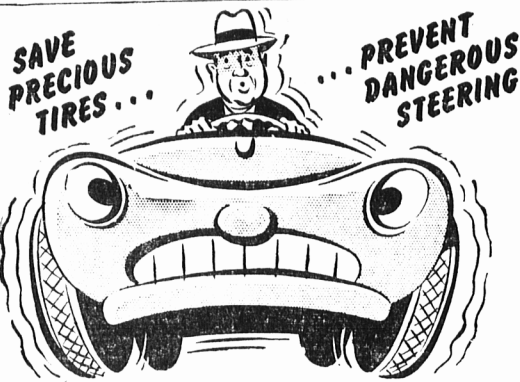

twentieth century. If this were the approved practice, a big bruiser on the sidelines could abuse a player of much less pugilistic prowess with impunity.
