much or more about agriculture from a wise farmer father or about citizenship from a public spirited father than from a school teacher. Even if the child doesn't learn anything in detail at home, he or she absorbs there much of the significance of things and the values of life which the school can tell him about in only an artificial way.

"How do they regard their homes? Is home an institution or between parties and meetings? It is interesting to note how often school difficulties are in direct proportion to the time the parents spend at home. And what is the family outlook on life? Is it a wholesome one of honest interest and service, or is it one of narrow self interest? For what motivates the home will usually motivate the child's work at school.

"What is done with spare time? Young people often learn as much in their spare time as they do in school and home. For the range of activities through which they can get an education in spare time is very great. Summer jobs can provide excellent experience as can hobbies, chores, a paper route, music lessons, cadet training, travel, or simple things like fishing and hiking in the country. And the experience is enhanced, not by doing too many such things and doing nothing well, but by concentrating on a few of them and getting the value out of them. Again the economic circumstances are no barrier, for there are many opportunities.

overdo the "only young one's" idea, and thereby encourage youngsters to idle away their time doing nothing. Moreover parents without help often are glad to turn the children loose to get them out of the way. But idling can easily become a habit, and laziness and wandering interest in later years frequently result from misuse of spare time in childhood.

**USEFUL ACTIVITIES**  
"Actually young people are happiest, not at endless aimless play, but at doing something useful. And by participating in useful activities they try out their own capabilities and thereby tend to be better able to decide what they want to do later on. And studies thrive on well-performed outside activities. Experience with young people reveals that a big majority of good students are good at other things besides study, while a big majority of poor students are not really good at anything. Which group a large girl will be in depends on a boy or extent on what is done outside of school when he or she is young.

"It is a weakness of the older humans, which is not shared in the animal or plant world, that they tend to talk down to young people and underestimate their capabilities. Actually children are far more capable than their elders are inclined to admit. The bad effects of baby talk, for example, are obvious, and yet the schools are doing too much damage to the reading and learning abilities of children. Children can be hampered by systematizing their work too much and by having too many "aids" to learning. Just as undue reliance on water wings won't enable one to swim, "aids" often discourage learning by making the learner too dependent on them. For example, one of the reasons why years of drawing in school produces so few good drawers and painters is the dependence on too many colouring books and "outlines".

"These things are being widely discussed in educational circles. But they should not divert attention from similar processes in the home and during spare time. If the home provides (1) the necessary accompaniments to schooling, especially sufficient sleep and food, and (2) opportunities for developing character, experience and responsibility through chores, summer jobs, family projects, and the like; and if spare time is "spent" not wasted, then schooling will be infinitely more effective. Certainly look to the school for education but look to the home and the school hours first. Improve educational facilities, but don't neglect more important things, such as that bowl of oatmeal!"

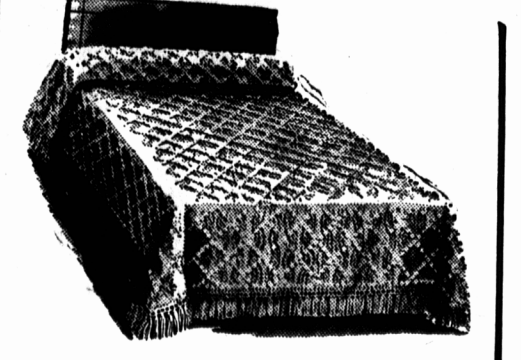

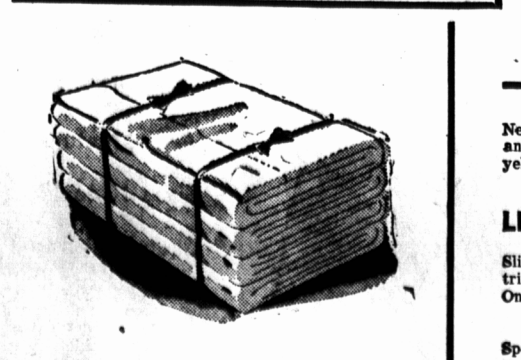

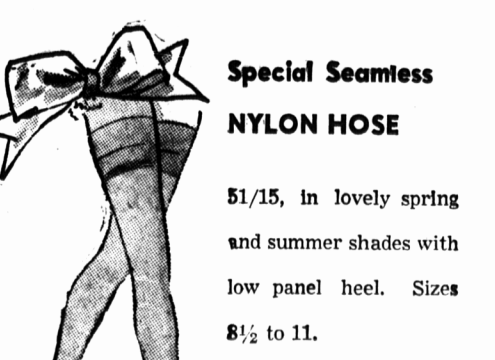
