Labor Dispute Closes Three Detroit Papers

DETROIT (AP)—The three daily newspapers in Detroit Sunday suspended publication indefinitely because of a labor dispute involving one of them. A statement issued by Robert C. Butz, executive secretary of the Detroit Newspaper Publishers Association, said: "An illegal strike against the Detroit News is forcing a shutdown of all three papers. The Detroit Newspaper Publishers Association makes contracts for the Detroit Free Press, the News and the Detroit Times jointly. Under these joint contracts a strike against one paper is a strike against all."

Yankees And Braves Open Up Big 7 1/2 Game Lead

By THE ASSOCIATED PRESS The New York Yankees, en route to their third straight American league pennant, forged into their biggest lead of the season Sunday, sweeping a doubleheader from Baltimore while the second-place Chicago White Sox were being held to a split in their win bill with Detroit.

The Reds, who had lost six in a row, were leading 4-2 after two innings of the second game when rain washed out the contest. THREE-HITTER The New York Giants swept a doubleheader from Philadelphia, 5-4 and 1-0, with Hank Sauer clubbing two home runs in the first game and Allan Worthington hurling a three-hitter in the second.

Tom Sturdivant's five-hit pitching in the opener and Yogi Berra's hitting in both games highlighted the Yankees' sweep over Baltimore. Berra collected five hits and drove in five runs, including all New York's runs in the nightcap. Bob Grim saved the second game victory for Don Lutz. He retired the Orioles in the eighth after coming in with the bases loaded and nobody out.

Dick Donovan's eight-hitter, his sixth triumph in succession, salvaged the White Sox to enable the final game of the four-game set with Detroit. The Tigers won the first three, including Sunday's opener, a four-hitter by Fran Lary. The Tiger righthander helped his cause with a two-run single in the sixth.
