## NOTES AND COMMENTS.

—According to the Gazette, the blunder of a messenger has been the means of making public a declaration on behalf of La Patrie, the organ in Montreal of the Liberal party, that it will not print prohibition arguments. The Gazette thinks there will be some remarkable conversions made before the Laurier Government forces a prohibition bill through the House of Commons it controls.

—This is how the Montreal Gazette puts it: The latest statement of the financial transactions of the Laurier Government shows that in each of the two years of existence it

Increased the taxes,  
 Increased the expenditure,  
 Increased the debt.

It has not given the country an economical Government. The scandals of the last two sessions of Parliament show that it has not given a clean administration. What is its excuse for existence?

—The Moncton Times says:—That bloated democrat, Sir Louis Davies, who a year or two ago made it a point to travel in second class cars and smoke his clay pipe with the horny-handed sons of toil, like that other "up-to-the-hilt democrat," Sir Wilfrid Laurier, has had his views considerably modified since his accession to office. He no longer has any use for second class cars— one of Mr. Blair's luxurious Wagners is not even good enough for him or his family; no, he has a private car suits the taste of this quondam democrat.

—The arrival of the Lake Winnipeg yesterday was witnessed by a large number of people, and great interest was manifested in the steamer. The outgoing cargo, as will be seen upon reference to another column, is a very good one. It is hoped that farmers and shippers generally will not be slow to take advantage of the opportunity afforded them by the direct steamer, and that she will have excellent cargoes on her other trips from this port. Mr Nelson Rattenbury is the Charlottetown agent, and he will at times be pleased to furnish information regarding the steamer and freight rates.

—The general election in New South Wales has greatly straightened the protectionist and federal parties in the Legislature. Mr Reid, the premier of the free trade Government, has had his majority of 40 cut down two or three, and it is a question whether the protectionists will not prove to be in the ascendant when the Assembly meets. The result is favorable to the federationist movement, as the difference between the free trade tariff of New South Wales and the protectionist tariffs of the other colonies has been one of the main difficulties in the way of a settlement

—The Montreal Gazette says: The "xets" in the Ottawa district are seeking to scare voters into marking their plebiscite ballots "No" by means of placards which give Sir Wilfrid Laurier as authority for the statement that prohibition means direct taxation. The "drys," it is said, are countering with posters which give the same high authority for the assertion that the loss of revenue by prohibition could be made up without a direct draft on the taxpayers' pockets. If it could be found out 'which way Sir Wilfrid will mark his own ballot, an inkling might be had as to which statement represents his convictions.

## A WITHERING TRIBUTE.

"The state of affairs simply is that the Liberals have collected much more money in taxation than the Conservatives thought of doing.  
 "That they have collected, indeed, more than they expected their levy to bring.  
 "That they have spent more money on consolidated fund account than the Conservatives did during either of these three years. (1894, 1895, and 1896.)  
 "That in addition they have spent more money on capital account than the Conservative have since they finished with the tremendous task of building the C.P.R.  
 "That they ran four millions behind on this last year's transactions alone.  
 "That their surplus is a sham and their comparisons with the deficit years of Conservative rule dishonest."—Montreal Star (Ind.)

## THE LAKE WINNIPEG.

Her Arrival in Charlottetown Yesterday.

The cold storage steamer Lake Winnipeg arrived here yesterday afternoon and is now lying at Peake's wharf. The Lake Winnipeg belongs to the Beaver Steamship Company, of Montreal. She was built in 1879 at Cl de Baie's, Dumbarton, Scotland, by J. and T. Thomson, of Glasgow. She is 355 feet 2 inches long, 40 feet 2 inches beam and 31 feet 2 inches deep. Her gross tonnage is 3329 and her net tonnage 2124. She has three decks and five holds, the lower one being the cold storage compartment. The engine room equipment is very complete, and the ordinary speed of the steamer is about 14 knots.

The Lake Winnipeg is commanded by Captain William Jones. Mr. McNichol is chief engineer and Mr. Bush, purser. She will make a second trip to Charlottetown next month and a third in November. She will leave here this afternoon about four o'clock and will be due at Liverpool about the 2nd October.

Her outward cargo will include 5000 boxes cheese shipped by Messrs. Dillon, B. Bin, H. Haszard and Carvell Bros; 500 packages butter, B. Heartz; 9000 cases eggs, Auld Bros and R. Jenkins; 800 sheep, E. Wheatley and B. Henderson; 75 cattle and 10 horses, E. Wheatley; 1000 sacks oats, Nelson Rattenbury; 100 tons hay, Carvell Bros and F. McKenna; 20 bbls apples, John Newson, Benj. Heartz and Charles Curtis.

## SALISBURY ON LOCAL OPTION.

Speaking at Newport, Oct. 7th, 1885, Lord Salisbury said:

"I do not think local option a bad thing where the thing to which it is to be applied is perfectly legitimate and we have admitted that the closing of public houses on Sunday is perfectly legitimate, where it is in accordance with the views of the population. Local option is also used for very different processes with which I have no kind of sympathy. It is proposed that localities shall have the power where the number of non-thirsty souls exceed the number of thirsty souls of saying that the thirsty souls shall have nothing at all to drink. Well that seems to me to trench upon the elementary liberties of mankind. If I like to drink beer it is no reason that I should be prevented from drinking beer because my neighbor does not like it, and that seems to me a simple doctrine, which lies at the root of all liberty. If you sacrifice it in alcohol you will find very soon that you will sacrifice it in other matters also, and that those doctrines of civil and religious liberty for which we have fought so hard and suffered so much will be gradually whittled away.

Ardent prohibitionists will please refrain from criticising his Lordship's words or demanding his resignation as premier of Great Britain until the present European crisis is over.
