NEWS BY TELEGRAPH.

CANADIAN.

TORONTO, Aug. 2.

An old pensioner named Simpson, living on York street, committed suicide this morning by taking a dose of Paris green. He was of intemperate habits and left a letter saying he was tired of life.

QUEBEC, Aug. 2.

His Honor the Lieut. Governor and Madame Robitaille lunched with His Excellency the Governor General and Princess Louise yesterday.

His Excellency the Governor General and his Royal Consort yesterday morning visited the Hotel Dieu Hospital and spent a couple of hours in inspecting the different wards, the chapels and other portions of this venerable institution.

Yesterday, as a carriage containing the Misses Letellier was going down Montebello hill, en route to the train for Kamouraska, the shaft broke, causing the horse to fall. The carriage upset, throwing out the occupants, and Miss Letellier received such injuries about the head as to prevent her proceeding on the journey.

The Hon. Luc Letellier De St. Just will to-day take his departure from the residence at Spencer Wood.

The meeting on the Esplanade, to be held at 4 p. m., will be addressed by Hon. Messrs. Huntington and Laurier, and perhaps also by Messrs. Blake and Mowat of Ontario.

HALIFAX.

HALIFAX, Aug. 2.

At Northeast Margaree, on Friday night, a man named Wm. Benton, said to be insane, struck his wife with a horse shoe while she was asleep and fractured her skull. Benton then left the house and went to the woods. Search was made for him and he could not be found until Saturday evening when he came out and went to his brother's house. He is still at liberty. His wife lies in a precarious condition but hopes of her recovery are entertained. He has a family of four or five children.

UNITED STATES.

NEW YORK, Aug. 3.

A Bismarck special says "Sitting Bull's brother, and a Chief, named Young Assinboine, were both killed in a fight with Gen. Miles.

Gen. Miles will locate his camp for the present, near the mouth of the Frenchman's Creek, and no fighting is expected unless Indians attack.

The seven lodges of half-breeds, engaged in the hardware business, and captured by Gen. Miles, will be brought from Fort Peck to Fort Buford, and an eye kept upon their movements.

Large bands of roaming hostiles are still on this side of the line.

TURNELS FALLS, Mass., Aug. 3.

One of the rotary boilers in the Montague Paper Company's mill exploded Saturday evening, killing Daniel Leary and slightly wounding two others.

NEW YORK, Aug. 3.

A Cuban merchant is said to have informed a newspaper reporter yesterday, that before fall there will be an uprising in various parts of the Island. Another said that there was much uneasiness in Havana, and that patriots in Santiago were already under arms.

NEW YORK, Aug. 3.

Thirteen members of a desperate gang of robbers, charged with burglary and outrages upon old people and other crimes, have been arrested and lodged in Reading, Penn., jail. They are all young German tramps.

David Anderson, one of the members of a picnic party at Englewood, New Jersey, on Friday, fell from palisades, 250 feet high; fatally injured. A horse had previously backed off the precipice, and with the wagon, was dashed to pieces.

MAGDALEN ISLANDS.

MAGDALEN ISLANDS, July 31.

via Pictou, Aug. 2.

Steamer Albert from Pictou, with the weekly mail, arrived here at 6 a. m. to-day.

On the 28th inst. the barque Perseverance, of South Shields, Barrows, master, from Quebec for Sunderland, laden with timber and deals, waterlogged and unmanageable, was stranded on the south side of Amherst Island, and during the night of the 20th she broke up and went to pieces. Part of her cargo was floated on shore and saved by salvors, and sold at auction yesterday for the benefit of whom it may concern. Her hull and materials are a total loss. Crew saved and forwarded to Pictou by steamer to-day.

The special term of our Superior Court has terminated to-day.

There has been very little fishing done during the week, for want of bait. Summer mackerel have not yet struck in.

The Government steamship "Napoleon III," with lighthouse supplies, arrived yesterday from the northward, and, after supplying the lighthouses here, proceeded to Pictou. Dr. Wakeham, the Dominion officer for the protection of the gulf fisheries, with a boat's crew, were on board the steamship "Napoleon," making their summer cruise.

A heavy thunder storm passed over the

Island last night, and rain fell in torrents. No serious damage is reported.

Vessels arrived: Schooners "Una" and "Lion," from Halifax; "Floetingwing" from Quebec. Sailed: Schooners "Foaming Billow" and "Elizabeth," for Pictou; "Emma Gidney," for Halifax; "Express," for Ship Harbor.

LONDON, Aug. 3.

Constantinople contractors for supply of coal to British ironclads now in Besika Bay, mention the Mediterranean ports.

Sir Garnet Wolseley's despatch to the war office is as follows: "I propose to form a brigade of artillery and engineers and a squadron cavalry for the Transvaal. I am reducing expenditures. I have given permission to Lord Chelmsford to return to England," and am disbanding some of the expensive irregular cavalry. Getaway is said to be in the Liguine forest.

The London Standard's despatch from Kwaawagnasa, July 11, states that the colonial cavalry corps have been ordered to disband.

The London Observer announces, "that in France shares in the Lessep's Panama Canal are at two francs discount," and remarks, "that it is not likely that there will be any demand for them in England."

It was reported yesterday, that a large firm in the East India trade had gone into liquidation with liabilities of £300,000. The difficulties are said to be mainly in connection with losses on coffee in Ceylon.

LONDON, Aug. 3.

The Standard's Vienna despatch says: "The excitement in Constantinople is so great that the Sultan is in constant fear of being superseded."

The firm whose failure was reported Saturday is George Wall & Co., of Colombo and London. Liabilities £300,000.

FRANCE.

PARIS, Aug. 3.

An enormous crowd was present to-day at the unveiling of the statue of the late ex-President Thiers.

M. DeMarece, Minister of the Interior, declared in his speech that the government was resolved remain true to the noble ideas of Thiers, namely: a conservative republic, guarding national traditions, and a just influence of France in Europe and the whole world.

Thiers Simon dwelt upon the firmness of Thiers in resisting even his own party when his liberal conservative convictions were touched. Simon concluded by saying: "France is saved; she possesses forever a republican government and liberty, teacher that while she has issued from a combat it is necessary for her either to vanquish her enemies or to ressure them. The definite form of revolution of 1870, is a conservative liberal republic such as Thiers created."

M. Martel, President of the Senate, also spoke.

THE ZULU WAR.

CAPE TOWN, July 15.

via MADEIRA, Aug. 2.

Gen. Crealoe's cavalry have been burned on the Ondini and Ngunwenne on the Eastern Line of the British advance.

Dabulmanzi, Cetewayo's brother, and several other important Chiefs, have surrendered to Chelmsford's movement of troops, retiring from the neighborhood of Klundi, and was expected to be retarded by heavy rains, and increasing difficulties which would prevent another advance this season, even if one was necessary.

Ekwore is to be re-occupied.

The naval brigade has been re-embarked for England. Volunteers which had originally been raised for a campaign against Sococolni has been ordered into position between Fort Webster and Derby, to the north of Zululand, so as to cut off Cetewayo's retreat northward, and prevent raids by Zulus in the neighborhood of the Intombi and Assagai rivers.

Puff Odder, an important Chief on the northern border of Cape Colony, has been captured.

The Colonial and Minister have informed the Assembly that they consider the present an inopportune time for giving effect to recommendation of the Home Government in favor of Confederation, but they would take steps to carry them out as soon as peace is restored.

The action of the Cape Government is generally approved.
