Priests Killed

As Kiddies Watch

LEOPOLDVILLE (AP) - The Roman Catholic missionaries reported killed by Congolese soldiers in Katanga province Jan. 1 were shot down before the eyes of school children, the Vatican news service said.

"Pray for us," the priests cried as they marched to be machine-gunned to death, the news service said.

First accounts received Tuesday on the New Year's Day massacre at Kongolo said 18 priests were killed and that another is missing.

The Vatican news service listed 20 names and said one of the 20 escaped. The one who escaped, it is not missing but was allowed to return to the mission the news service said. One of the 20 was listed as German. The others were believed to be Belgians. All were the names of males.

The Vatican news service said its account came from a young seminarian who witnessed the massacre and escaped. His name was not disclosed.
