SIR CHARLES VINDICATED.

The views of Sir Charles Tupper, lately expressed and published, are regarded with favor by all independent and patriotic men. His tone in opposition is in striking contrast with that of the party which now holds office. The Mail and Empire points out that while Sir Charles treats his more active enemies with forbearance, and the Ministers, particularly those engaged at Washington, with helpful, and almost parental, consideration, he stands as firmly as ever by the great principle of progress. "Closely associated for so many years with every step in our advancement as a people, he could not forget the basic doctrine of his party without forgetting himself. His has been a sturdy fight for Canada against great odds. We owe much to him for his struggle for the unification of the five old provinces. We owe him a great deal also for his work in co-operation with Sir John MacDonall, for the acquisition of the North-West and British Columbia, and for the establishment of railway communication across the continent. He fought these projects throughably, and his vindication is before him. There is not an opponent of his who is not to-day a living witness to the wisdom of the course which he and his great colleagues took in these national issues. Nor on the fiscal question does he fail of justification. The most interesting spectacle of the hour is the position of his antagonists, who, afraid to place their own views in full operation, have swallowed him, in large measure, and are now proving that, so far as they have been retained, they are good."

BISHOP BONDS VIEWS.

BISHOP BOND, of Montreal, is strongly in favor of the legal prohibition of the liquor traffic. In the course of a recent charge, after adducing the arguments of certain good men who are averse to prohibition, while at the same time they advocate a temperance as severe as that of the prohibitionists, the speaker said:

"Now all this, to my mind, makes for prohibition. I do not think I have understated the arguments of these good men, and I have not entangled the question with the reasoning of those few who oppose from a fear thereby of weakening faith in God. If all this be true, as I think it is, and due in no small measure to the advocates of prohibition, then let us promote and hasten the process, 'make it easy to do right and difficult to do wrong.' Let us adopt Father Matthew's decision 'The principle of prohibition seems to me,' he says, 'the only safe and certain remedy for the evils of intemperance.' I add the liquor traffic is most injurious to the best interests of the commonwealth from every point of view. It provides a beverage, which eventually impairs (if not destroys) the mental powers, which has a pernicious effect on the body, which prevents to evil the family and social intercourse, and which destroys the happiness and prosperity of millions. 'Viewed in its spiritual aspect, its working is most disastrous; viewed in its humanitarian aspect, its action on mankind is most deteriorating.

After quoting eminent authorities on the widespread evils wrought by intemperance, Bishop Bond concluded this portion of his charge by repudiating the insinuations that smuggling would be increased, and that the revenue of the country would suffer if prohibition were adopted.

A CORRECTION.

ONE of the many readers of THE EXAMINER in the country has directed our attention to a mistake in our last week's statement of Government expenditure, revenues, and deficits. The mistake arises out of the fact that the Liberals obtained office in 1891, not in 1893. The latter year was the notable one of the general election; and so, without referring to our files, we took that as the beginning of the Liberal period. The comparison is not greatly affected by the re-statement of figures required to make the statement right:

The Government party have evidently failed to fulfil the pledge upon which they gained power, viz., that they would "make ends meet." Though they have had an average of \$15,600 a year more than their predecessors, they have—not to promote agriculture, education or any other public service,—added \$30,000 a year, in round numbers, to the expenditures. It is time they were turned out; and we hope that the deceived electors of the fourth and fifth electoral districts of Prince County will begin the good work.

CHINESE PROBLEM.

Lord Beresford, after a careful study of the Chinese problem, has come to the conclusion that there are but three policies to be pursued: (1) the open door, (2) spheres of influence, (3) drift. The first is favored by Lord Beresford as the best basis for the integrity of China and as the basis upon which an alliance may be formed between Great Britain, the United States, Germany, and Japan. Lord Beresford says that the whole system of Chinese administration requires reform.
