Co-Operative Journeys Down Through The Years

Within the past half century, there have been a considerable number and variety of co-operative ventures launched in this Province covering marketing and purchasing needs of local communities in which they originated.

The three organizations that continued to function sufficiently long to demonstrate the value of co-operative effort to the individuals participating, and the particular phase of agriculture affected, were the ex-Prince Edward Island Co-Operative Egg and Poultry Association; the ex-Prince Edward Island Livestock Marketing Board; the Prince Edward Island Potato Growers' Association.

I would like to deal with these three in some detail to refresh the waning memories and other faculties of the now older generation yet with us, who participated in their creation, promotion and patronage and subsequently gave over their inopportune passing from the picture, and manner of termination of the two that did succumb.

The Prince Edward Island Co-Operative Egg and Poultry Association was the original co-operative marketing organization of capacity in the Province devoting its energies towards the disposal of specific items of agricultural production.

It was almost continually a casualty industry in the Province, occasionally enjoying a "break" but generally in a state of "relapse" or almost utter collapse, or with the unhappy inhabitants foraging and suffering as a result of the chief concern of successive governments seemed to be that of devising ways and means of becoming firmly entrenched in office following an election; and continually planning how best to outlast his opponent at the earliest opportunity.

The Commissioner of Agriculture in the new government was a farmer, medium in years but mature in experience and conscious from personal contact and participation, of the vile conditions under which agriculture was forced to function and the continuous discrimination that existed against the industry and its operators.
