

U.S. Oil Import Program Seen Unchanged For 1966

WASHINGTON (AP)—President Johnson has signed a proclamation continuing the oil import program in 1966 almost unchanged from its present form.

One amendment will permit import allocations for Petrochemical firms in the United States and Puerto Rico.

Interior Secretary Stewart L. Udall announced the import program plans at a press conference, and Johnson later signed the proclamation at his ranch in Texas.

The Independent Petroleum Association of America raised immediate objections.

In a statement, association president F. Allen Calvert Jr. said "the changes in the 1966 oil import program do nothing to strengthen the security of the United States as to its vital supplies of petroleum products."

Udall said the changes are based on the unanimous recommendation of his department and all other interested departments and agencies.

He said the oil industry has experienced a particularly stable year during 1965, and credited the import control program with being a factor "because the domestic industry had a larger share of the annual growth in demand."

On the question of effect of the program on Venezuela, Canada, Udall said discussions "didn't produce the type of ultimate consensus" that could result in changes affecting them. But he also said Venezuela, traditionally a big U.S. supplier, is regarded as a special situation and discussions will proceed, aimed at working something out with that country later on.

New Map Published

OTTAWA (CP)—The department of mines and technical surveys has published what it describes as "a new and unusual map of the northern hemisphere."

The department said that the map "gives the viewer the impression of looking down at the world from a point directly above the North Pole."

However, this meant areas in latitudes south of the 60th parallel — the line separating the provinces from the territories — are "somewhat stretched" on the 34-inch square map. The scale takes this into account.

The North Pole is at the center and 70 per cent of the world's land mass above the equator is depicted.

Detail shows countries, major cities and towns and principal drainage systems.

In response to questions Udall said the changes will not affect the status of Canada and Venezuela under the oil import program.

But he said, discussions will continue with Venezuela, which is seeking a means of increasing its exports to the U.S.

The changes in regard to petrochemicals will open the way for establishment of new producing facilities in Puerto Rico where the Phillips Petroleum Co. already has under way the nucleus of a proposed \$300,000,000 petro-chemical operation.

STARTS JAN. 1

The new program will become effective Jan. 1 covering imports of petroleum and petroleum products and will shift allocations from a semi-annual to an annual basis.

The oil import control program for residual fuel oil brought into the east coast area operates on a different basis and Udall said it was not involved in any way in the new changes.

Bishops Get Meat Ruling For Holidays

VATICAN CITY (AP)—Pope Paul has authorized Roman Catholic bishops around the world to permit their parishioners to eat meat on Christmas and New Year's eves—both of which fall on Friday, traditional day for fasting.

The papal permission, however, left it up to the bishops to decide if the dispensation was "necessary or opportune" and to set any conditions they wanted.

In some dioceses bishops granted the dispensation, but said that those who took advantage of it must forego meat on the Thursday before.

During the ecumenical council there were reports that the Pope would announce an end to Friday fasting, but this has not happened. Vatican sources said such an announcement would not come before early 1966.

This hand occurred in the match between Italy and the United States in 1957. The Italian East, playing weak two bids and taking advantage of the vulnerability opened with two spades. South doubled and then passed North's response of three notrump.

West now came in with four clubs, over which North made a forcing pass. When South then bid four diamonds, North leaped to six.

This contract went down one — 100 points — when West led a heart to the ace and ruffed South's jack on the return.
