**Moralistic Attitude Is Found No Help In Obesity Problem**

**NIAGARA FALLS, Ont. (CP)**—Overweight is a problem that can't be solved by a moralistic attitude but only by sympathetic understanding and support, medical nutrition professor Dr. Charlotte Young said Tuesday.

The Cornell University professor spoke to the Canadian Dietetic Association convention here on the "current approach to obesity."

The most important factor in obesity, she said, is that we live in anxious times with little outlet for anxieties and many find solace in food and drink for their frustrations and hostilities.

Another cause was the decreased energy output because "modern living adds up to making us unwittingly physically lazier and lazier."

"There are shorter work weeks, labor saving devices and motor locomotion instead of walking, contrasted with the vigorous labor of a generation ago."

**INVOLVES HOSPITALITY**  
In our highly competitive society, every effort was made to induce people to buy and use more food.

"Another important factor is that the hospitality of our culture is built around feeding people," she said.

"Much can be done through education and by an intelligent understanding of obesity, with regard to better food habits in tune with the restricted caloric needs of modern living, with regard to the need for greater planned physical activity . . . and with regard to a more constructive use of leisure time."

Another speaker, physiotherapist Dorothy Madgett of Toronto, spoke on relaxation and preventative medicine.

There are two types of tension, she said. Emotional tension, caused by anger, worry, fear and irritation, stimulated the nervous system and caused muscular tension.

A buildup of muscular tension could be prevented by learning to relax. One method was to use persons or objects as reminders to relax.

**Pharmacists Urge Sales Tax On Drugs End**

**VANCOUVER (CP)**—A resolution asking the federal government to remove the existing sales tax on drugs was passed here Monday at the annual convention of the National Council of Women.

The resolution said drugs and pharmaceutical preparations "are a basic necessity in maintaining the health of citizens, ranking on an equal basis with food" which is free from federal sales tax.
